Joseph expressed by Jefferson more than 150 years ago is as true today as when written. I hope my trustees and their successors in office will observe and apply it in administering this trust."

Trustees of the foundation are Aubrey Lee Brooks, Thornton Higbie Brooks, and James Taylor Brooks of Greensboro, Charles M. Shaffer of Chapel Hill, the president, vice president, finance officer and secretary of the Consolidated University of North Carolina, and the chancellors of the three units of the University.

Selection committees will be set up in each of the counties and applicants will receive booklets prescribing qualifications and the selection procedure. In the foreword of the booklet is contained a biographical sketch of the life of Aubrey Lee Brooks. He was born May 21, 1771 on his father's plantation in Person County. After grade and high school, young Aubrey Lee Brooks "lifted himself by his own educational shoe - strings." He taught school a year and with his savings and some borrowing he accumulated enough money to go to Chapel Hill and enter the University. After a couple of years he

dropped out; but his love of law drew him back to Chapel Hill and the University Law School.

He became one of the states most distinguished and most successful lawyers. He earned the highest fee ever paid a lawyer in North Carolina, yet he was never to busy to defend the poorest man who sought his help. A. L. Brooks constantly championed the cause of the "under-dog."

Mr. Brooks and his wife, the former Miss Helen Higbie of New Jersey, live on Sunset Drive, Greensboro. Their two sons are Thornton Higbie Brooks, Greensboro attorney, and James Taylor Brooks, a practicing physician of Greensboro. A third son, Aubrey Lee Brooks, Jr., died as a result of an automobile accident when he was a student at Chapel Hill.

Through the years Mr. Brooks has contributed to many causes in North Carolina, among them the Presbyterian Church, the Boy Scouts and the University of North Carolina Press to which he gave an endowment fund currently valued at a quarter of a million dollars.

An average of three years of test growing of "Boone" late blight resistant Irish potato variety shows the new variety also slightly out-yields both Kennebec and Sequoia.

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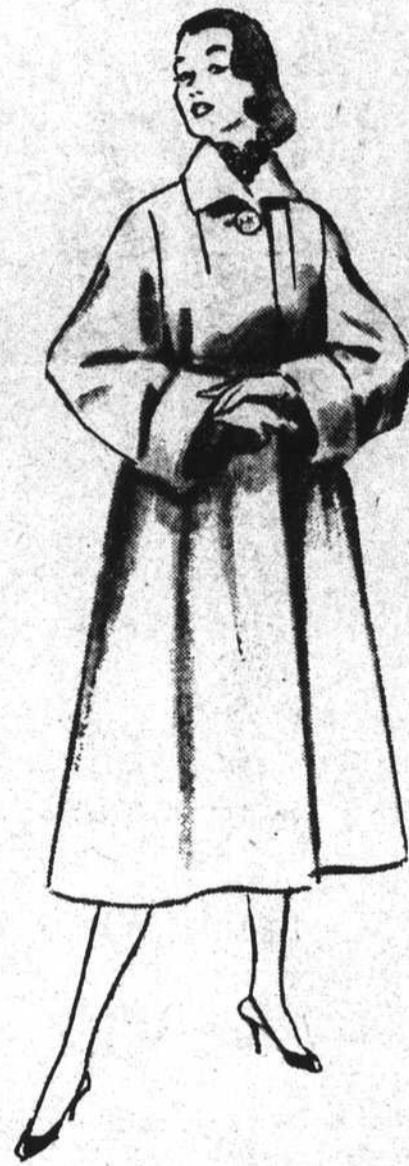
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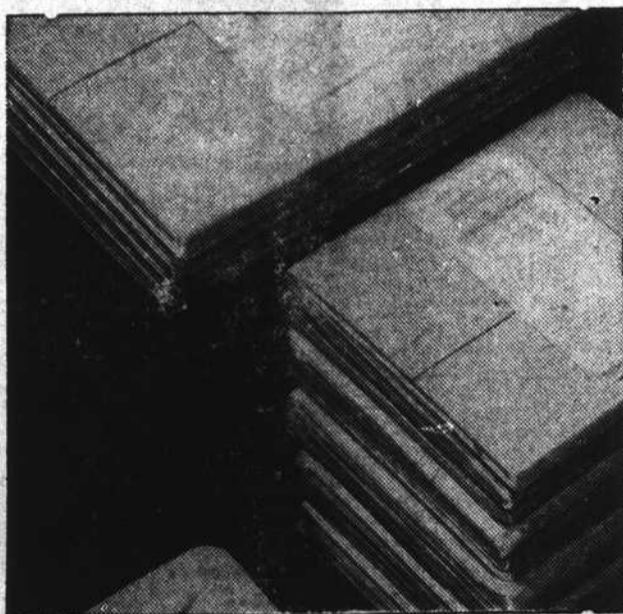
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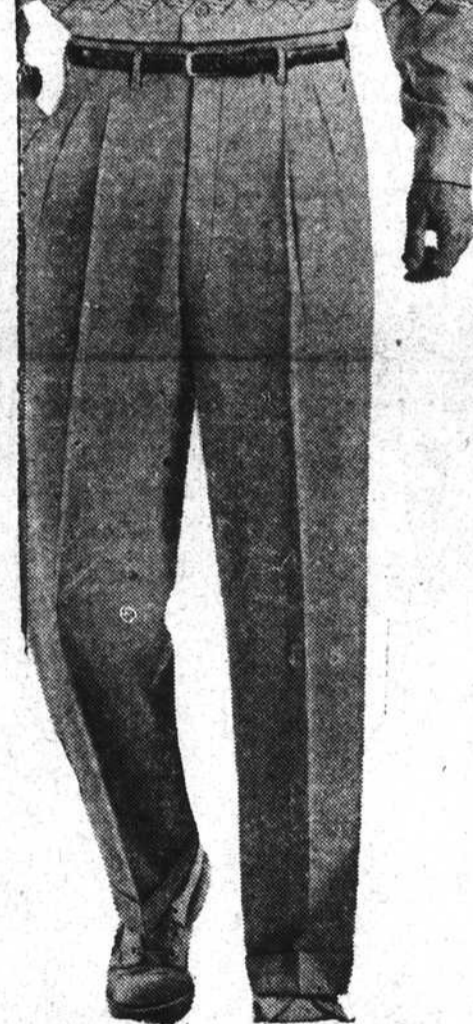
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
