Question: Where should you direct your eyes in meeting cars at night?
Answer: In daylight driving you center your car between the centerline and the right shoulder of the road. In the driver's position you see where the right edge of the pavement "cuts" the hood of your car. Thus, at night when you are meeting blinding lights, you should maneuver your car to keep the hood in the same position relative to the pavement. If you direct your eyes across the hood to the edge of the pavement, you ought to be able to maintain proper position.

Question: How may a trucker signal "clear ahead" or danger to drivers behind?
Answer: From his higher position overlooking the road a truck driver can see the area ahead in clear before the driver of a passenger car behind can tell whether it is safe to pass. Sometimes he'll signal to come on around. However,

this is merely a courtesy; it has no legal sanction. Other times, the trucker may spot danger ahead and flash his rear lights on and off rapidly. It is wise then to delay a pass when such a signal is given.

Question: Why is an excessively slow driver a traffic hazard?
Answer: Normal driving speed is the speed around which most vehicles travel. Any speed that is abnormally higher—or lower—creates a condition where lots of passing is necessary. A slow driver creates this hazard as does a fast driver.

ASC To Offer Aid To More Producers

One objective of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Offices throughout the state next year will be to reach every farmer who has not participated in ASC's conservation program for a number of years.

H. V. Mangum of the state ASC office, reports that all counties in the state have been requested to make a special analysis of participation in the Agricultural Conservation Program for 1955 through 1955. The results of this analysis will be used in each office in a concerted attempt to reach new farms and new farmers, he said.

Farmers in this state in 1955 will have an opportunity of making better use of their Agricultural Conservation Program than they ever had before. Mangum emphasized.

With allotments on tobacco, peanuts, cotton, wheat, and corn, and with the need to shift production from some of the acreage in these crops, all farmers have an opportunity to use the Agricultural Conservation Program in the seeding of grasses and legumes. In doing this, farmers will not only be helping to bring production into balance, but they will be building reserves in the soil for future needs.

The seeding of grasses and legumes is only a part of the job of most effective conservation. To obtain the maximum in stands and growth, Mangum points out, most soils require the application of lime and minerals, and the Agricultural Conservation practices providing for application of these materials are an important part of next year's conservation effort.
