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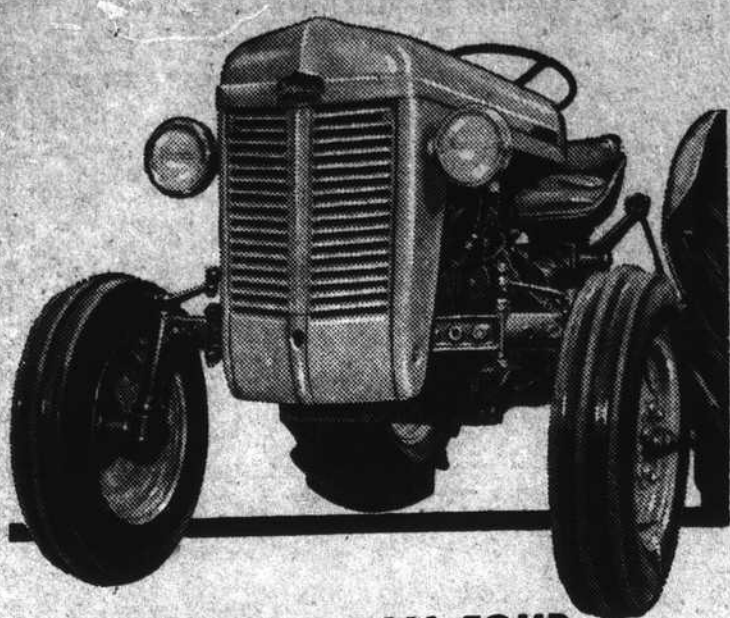

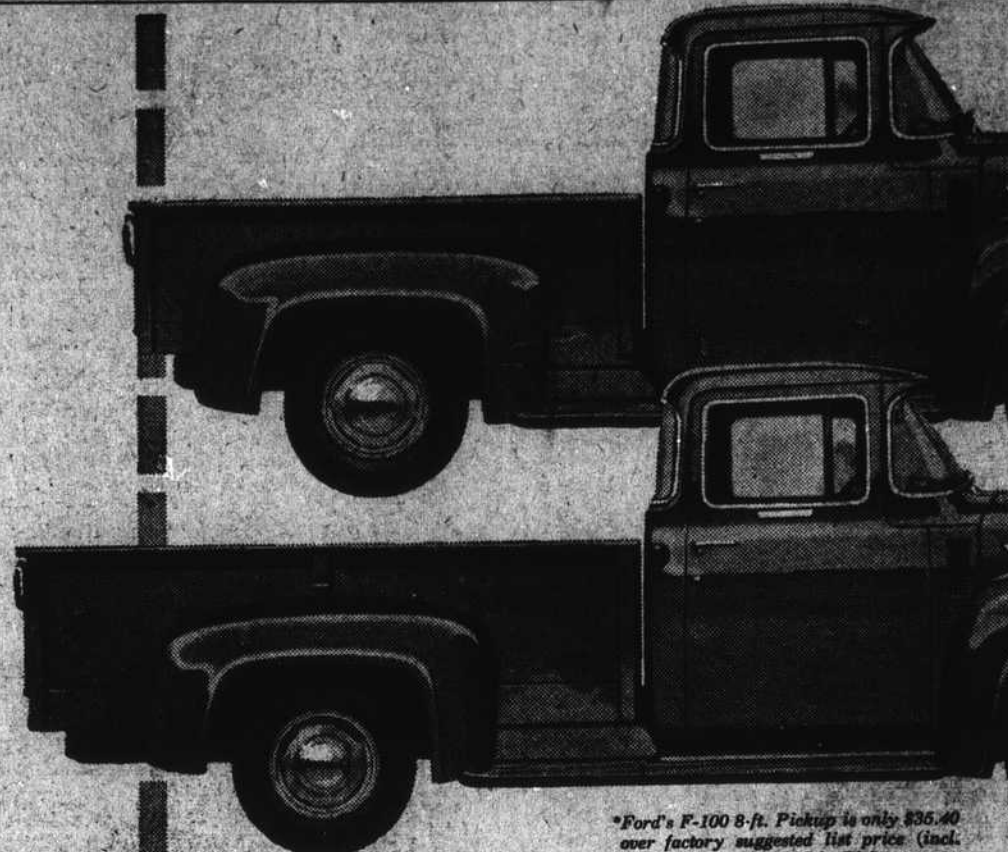

dam. It can be cut, he stated, for any style of use which the college's architect might desire—solid walls, used as Roman brick or in rough pieces.

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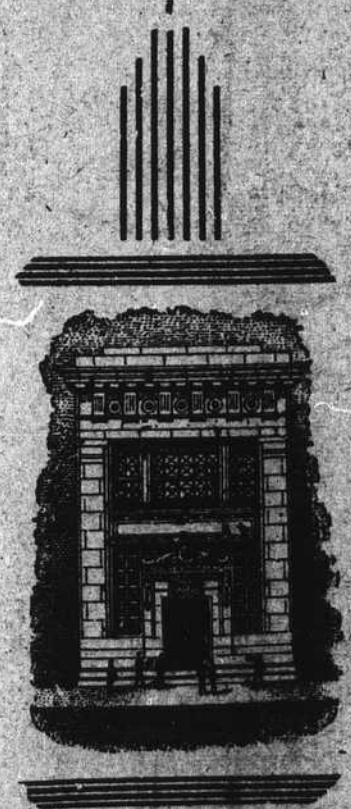
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
