Garden Study Club In Meeting

Garden Study Club members heard an interesting talk on "Scientific Names" by Mrs. F. R. Lawson at a meeting Wednesday morning at the Community House. Mrs. Dermont Hedrick and Mrs. Arch Taylor, Jr., were co-hostesses.

Mrs. Lawson told her audience that "No one needs to spend more time studying scientific names than that individual happens to want to. But perhaps we should know why they are important, or, to some people, even necessary."

All plants have a genus and species name, some that have been cross bred by men desirous of improving our garden plants will also have a variety name.

The Madonna Lily is known in various parts of the country as Annunciation Lily, Lent Lily, St. Joseph's Lily and Bourbon Lily. This would be most confusing but it has one name known anywhere, Lillium Candidum.

This kind of confusion occurs in other plant families also, she explained. "Some of these names are so generally accepted that there would be no chance of error if we ordered by common name. But in many cases greater accuracy is necessary. It is important to know the correct name or widely accepted common name in order to look up cultural information on a plant, when, where and how to cultivate," she said.

Mrs. Lawson concluded her talk by showing scientific names and their meanings on a blackboard. Mrs. Andrew Jamieson gave information on the Eleventh Annual
