Youth Who Drowns

Granville Rescue Squad Recovers Body of Allen Gene Raby. 17, In Pond

Sinking just after his plunge into a farm pond Saturday night, Al-len Gene Raby, 17, became the first swimming accident victim of this year in Granville County.

The body of young Raby was pulled from about eight feet of water by a crew of the Granville Rescue Squad just after a rescue boat was launched. An hour of artificial respiration failed to bring the youth around. He had been in the water close to an hour.

Coroner Grover Saunders, who investigated, said there was no indication of foul play and he attributed death to drowning. No in-
