CARE OF IRIS RHIZOMES

Question: Some of my iris rhizomes have become soft and give off a bad odor. What's wrong?

Answer: Probably a disease called soft rot. Soft rot causes the rhizomes to become mush and have a disagreeable odor. The leaves turn brown and fall. Infection takes place almost entirely through wounds, especially wounds made by the iris borer. To control cut out and burn all diseased growth and soak healthy rhizomes with a solution of bicarbonate of mercury for 10 minutes. Use eight grain tablets in a quart of water.
