4TH ARMORED DIV., GERMANY—Army Sp-4 Herman Jones, 23, son of Mrs. Elsie Mae Champion, Route 3, Oxford, recently participated with other personnel from the 4th Armored Division in special German-American Week activities in Germany.

The activities, part of the Power for Peace program, included a German-American military parade, an equipment and weapons demonstration, a parachute demonstration and sports competition.

Specialist Jones, who arrived overseas in April 1958, is an automatic rifleman in Company B of the division's 50th Infantry in England. He completed basic training at Fort Hood, Tex.

A former student at Oxford High School, Jones worked for the Lee Dyeing Co. in Butner before enlisting in the Army in November 1958.

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Area Development in N. C. Proves Helpful

North Carolina now has nine active Area Development Associations, embracing 70 of the state's 100 counties.

"In the past year, there has been a 10 per cent increase in the number of organized communities with action programs," says John Crawford. He's the specialist at State College in charge of community development work.

Seventy-one communities have been organized in the last year, bringing the total to 776 in 81 counties, Crawford says. Some counties are not in area associations. There are about 70,000 families taking part in the community programs.

"Two new Area Development Associations have been organized, and they have begun action programs," he says. "These are the Sandhills Area, including four counties—Lee, Moore, Montgomery and Richmond; and the North Central Area, including Durham, Orange and Person."

Crawford believes there could be from 2,000 to 2,500 organized communities in North Carolina, all working actively to improve the living standards of their citizens.
