Your Pre-School Child

Helping Your Child to Become Self-Sufficient for School Experiences

The first day of school! What a wealth of meaning and magic there is in that phrase. But remember that no magic will make our children suddenly grow up as they step into first grade. What happens then, as all through life, will be the logical outcome of all that has gone before.

The Schedule

Pre-school conferences for white and Negro children begin in Granville March 15 and will continue on schedule through May 5. Dr. W. P. Wheeler of the Granville Health Department said the series would begin at 9 a.m. in designated schools with the exception of Berea, which is to be at 1 p.m. tomorrow, Wednesday. The schedule for next week is: Stem, March 21; Shaw, March 22; Oak Hill, March 23; Wilton, March 24, all at 9 a.m.

Our child's first year in school can indeed be magic if we have planned carefully to make him a self-sufficient little person.

Our child's development as an independent and self-sufficient being centers around habit training in the processes of sleeping, dressing, playing, eating and good bathroom habits. Being a good first grader implies the acquisition of these habits. As the child grows older the above habits should become well established and automatic.

How To Begin

When your child starts to school, he is expected to know how to wash and dry his hands, tie and untie shoes, put on and take off all outdoor clothes, and take off all outdoor clothes.
