Jones began brooding over the threat, and remembering the trouble the two had experienced earlie in the night Jones said he walked to his home, a mile away, secured Woodlief, Danny Bowling and his automatic rifle, walked back to the Thompson place and fired.

Thompson was found lying on his stomach, a bullet wound in the back of his head. Sheriff Jones said he believed Melvin Jones shot Thompson at


