### Soil Tests Are Beneficial, Says Chairman Morgan

"Have crops on your farm been making top yields?" asks C. V. Morgan, county extension chairman. If not, you will want to examine your entire production program and see where improvements can be made. Top yields require the right kind and amounts of fertilizer—and maybe lime. Since it is not possible to look at a soil and see what deficiencies exist, soil tests provide information useful in deciding if fertilization practices have been adequate and what changes are needed.

The plant food requirements of a crop can be supplied by fertilizer broadcast before planting, at planting and topdressed or sidedressed after the crop is established. For example, soils low in phosphorus may need broadcast applications of phosphates in addition to normal fertilization, if top yields are to be produced. Similar conditions may be encountered with potassium. But, sidedressing or topdressing the potassium fertilizer near the time when the crop has its highest requirement for the nutrient may be desirable, especially on sandy soils. These soils usually have a low capacity to hold potassium against leaching.

Most soils are low in nitrogen unless planted to a legume crop. The average soil also has a low capacity to hold nitrogen against leaching. Therefore, the accepted practice is to have some nitrogen in the fertilizer used at planting time and to apply the remainder needed in one or more applications. However, potassium and nitrogen applied ahead of planting have been satisfactory on soils medium to high in clay. Soil tests information provides a guide for adjusting fertilization practices to insure that the crop has an adequate supply of available plant foods at a time when they are needed. A condition essential for top yields says Morgan.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

On motion of Commissioner J. W. Boring, second by Commissioner, L. E. Breedlove, the Board of Commissioners for the City of Oxford, North Carolina, passed the following Ordinance:

#### AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE USE OF PYROTECHNICS WITHIN THE CITY OF OXFORD, NORTH CAROLINA:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF OXFORD, NORTH CAROLINA:

#### SECTION 1. MANUFACTURE, SALE AND USE OF PYROTECHNICS PROHIBITED; PUBLIC EXHIBITIONS PERMITTED;

It shall be unlawful for any individual, firm, partnership, or corporation to manufacture, purchase, sell, deal in, transport, possess, receive, advertise, use or cause to be discharged any pyrotechnics of any description whatsoever within the City of Oxford, North Carolina; provided, however, that it shall be permissible for pyrotechnics to be exhibited, used or discharged at public exhibition, such as fairs, carnivals, shows of all descriptions and public celebration; provided, further, that the use of said pyrotechnics in connection with public exhibitions, such as fairs, carnivals, shows of all descriptions and public celebrations, shall be under supervision of experts who have previously secured written authority from the Board of Commissioners of the City of Oxford, North Carolina; provided, further, that it shall not be unlawful for a common carrier to receive, transport, and deliver pyrotechnics in the regular course of its business.

#### SECTION 2. POSSESSION PRIMA FACIE EVIDENCE OF VIOLATION.

Possession of pyrotechnics by any person, for any purposes other than those permitted under this ordinance, shall be prima facie evidence that such pyrotech-

nics are kept for the purpose of being manufactured, sold, bartered, exchanged, given away, received, furnished, otherwise, disposed of, or used in violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

#### SECTION 3. PERMITS FOR USE AT PUBLIC EXHIBITIONS.

For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, the Board of Commissioners of Oxford, North Carolina, are hereby empowered and authorized to issue permits for use in connection with the conduct of public exhibition, such as fairs, carnivals, shows of all descriptions and public exhibitions, but only after satisfactory evidence is produced to the effect that said pyrotechnics will be used for the aforementioned purposes and none other.

#### SECTION 4. PYROTECHNICS DEFINED; EXCEPTIONS.

For the proper construction of the provision of this ordinance, "pyrotechnics," is herein used, shall be deemed to be and include any and all kinds of fireworks, and explosives, which are used for exhibitions or amusement purposes; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the manufacture, purchase, sale, transportation, and use of explosives or signaling flares used in the course of ordinary business or industry, or shells or

cartridges used as ammunition in firearms. This ordinance shall not apply to the sale, use, or possession of explosives caps designed to be fired in toy cap pistols, provided, that the explosive mixture of such explosives caps shall not exceed twenty-five hundredths (.25) of a grain for each cap.

#### SECTION 5. VIOLATION MADE MISDEMEANOR.

Any persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, except as otherwise specified in said ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined an amount not to exceed Fifty and no-100 (\$50.00 Dollars) or imprisoned for a term not to exceed thirty (30) days, or both, in the discretion of the Court.
