White said the youth, whom he knew well, whipped around the police car, turned into Main, east on Littlejohn, south on Gilliam, east on Spring, south on Military and into High and then east into Green Acres. White said Hart operated the machine at speeds up to 80 miles an hour and almost overturned the vehicle on two or three occasions as he continued in wanton disregard for the safety of himself and others.

Hart was arrested on New College Street some while after he had successfully eluded the officers.

Meanwhile, Dement, 20, has been charged with permitting an unlicensed person to operate a motor vehicle. Dement paid a fine of \$25 and costs on a plea of guilty he made in recorder's court.

The Hart case has been set for trial June 23.

Enthusiastic Crowd Greet Dan K. Moore

Wear Campaigner for Governor Woos Lake Supporters During Short Address Here Friday

Dan Moore, speaking for a little more than five minutes, during a visit to Granville late Friday afternoon, made a firm appeal for support in his campaign for governor, telling his audience, many of them from the former Lake camp, that their support of his candidacy "would help to give the people of North Carolina the kind of government they deserve."

Moore and his party arrived here from Henderson and the candidate and his wife, with the latter escorted by Granville Co-Manager Tom Allen and the former by Co-Manager Willis Hancock, were greeted by a cheering, standing ovation by the large crowd of men and women who had waited for more than an hour.

Mrs. Moore, presented by Hancock as "the next first lady of North Carolina," spoke briefly following a prayer by Allen. She said the Moore party had experienced "a warm, wonderful reception" in the swing through Eastern North Carolina, where 15-25 stops had been made each day.

She said a "mountain delegation" of friends had been traveling with the party and that they had been inspired by what they had seen in Eastern North Carolina. "They are going home today to work harder and with new inspiration for the nomination of Dan K. Moore in the party primary on May 27," she said. Moore carried the mountain counties almost solidly in the first primary and later carried the east.

Presented by Hancock as "a man like you and me," Moore appeared confident, but weary from a strenuous week of intensive campaigning in territory which voted strongly May 30 for Dr. I. B. Lake.

Taking cognizance of the presence of Lake's Granville County campaign force at the rally here, Moore praised Dr. Lake's stability and integrity and told Lake's former supporters "You can gain the objectives you voted for in Dr. Lake and gain good government in North Carolina and be a part of that administration" by supporting Dan K. Moore in the June 27 primary.

Moore said he had been accused of attempting to destroy North Carolina's road program. His answer was that he wants to work for and achieve a full measure of worth for every dollar spent for roads in North Carolina and he said this can best be achieved by a system of competitive bidding on the large construction jobs.

He had no plan, he said, for changing the utilization of road maintenance forces of the state.

Moore pledged his best efforts in keeping North Carolina advancing in the realm of schools, highways, job opportunities and farming. He invited any who have question about his program or policies to visit him for a sit-down session and discussion.

Brooks Harris of Henderson, auctioneer, concluded the meeting with a chanting song calling for a total of 19 Granville County precincts for Moore in the June 27 primary.

Board Approves Budget for Year

Total County Outlay for 1964 Fiscal Year Is \$1,416,595.55 —Rate Represents 3 Cent Reduction

County Commissioners, meeting here Thursday, chopped three cents from the tax rate for 1964-65, dropping it to \$1.77 from the \$1.80 of the previous year as they authorized expenditures of \$1,416,595.55 in the fiscal year which begins July 1.

Biggest items in the 1964 budget are the funds needed for general fund and current expenses of schools. General fund expenditures of \$206,673.55 will be provided by \$149,610 from miscellaneous revenue and surplus and the remaining \$57,063.55 from the tax levy. The levy will provide \$183,000 for the school current expense fund and \$62,185 from miscellaneous and surplus funds will provide the \$245,185 required in the budget.

Of the \$1,416,595.55 required to meet authorized expenditures during the year ahead, \$39,185.55 will come from the county tax levy and the remaining \$377,400 will come from miscellaneous revenue and surpluses, stated County Auditor I. W. Bullock.

A flat fifteen cents of the rate is levied on basis of direct authorization of voters and will provide \$70,950 of the \$76,350 required for the school supplement.

Other expenditures approved for the year:

Planning commission \$9,000; county fire departments \$10,000; building fund \$26,175; health fund \$41,836; hospital maintenance \$27,000; county portion of farm and home agents fund \$32,884; library fund \$42,430; welfare fund \$50,853.45; aid to the blind \$7,772.77.

Old age assistance benefits paid aid to permanently and totally disabled \$83,875; aid to dependent children \$64,553; medical care for aged \$2,804; county debt service \$25,975; school debt service \$118,750; school current expenses \$245,185; school capital outlay \$469,170.

Earlier Records

The 1964 tax rate is based on a valuation of \$52,000,000, up \$2,000,000 from the \$50,000,000 of 1963 when the rate totaled \$1.80.

The valuation in 1960 was \$42,000,000 and the rate that year was \$1.60, with an additional 15 cents in Oxford School district. In 1959, the value was \$43,000,000 and the rate was \$1.77 with 15 cents additional in the Oxford school district.

In 1962, the county wide rate was \$1.66 and the valuation was \$49,000,000. The Oxford district school levy that year was 14 cents.

For tax purposes, property values in Granville are 50 per cent of the appraised worth of real estate, fixed at the nearest round numbers.
