Airport Site Gets Approval of FAA; Engineers at Work

Local Representatives to Seek Appointment of Authority Members

Federal Aviation Authority has given final approval to the proposed site of the joint airport serving Oxford and Henderson areas.

This action, according to John K. Nelms, who represents the City of Oxford in negotiations with Henderson and Vance County authorities in development plans, signals clearance for moving ahead with other development procedures, including engineering.

John Talbert & Associates of Wilmington, earlier engaged for the engineering, are presently engaged on more than 125 acres of the site area.

Nelms said himself and W. W. Yeargin, agent of the county in the airport development undertaking, would petition Henderson Board of Commissioners and the Vance County Board of Commissioners to designate their representatives on the proposed airport authority.

Meanwhile, North Carolina Aviation Commission has made a grant of \$20,000 toward cost of development of the joint airport and pending, on basis of an earlier grant to Henderson and Vance County, is a FAA grant.

The FAA site approval means that it has been determined that establishment of the airport at the proposed site would not in any manner interfere with existing routes and airline communications systems.

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Two Candidates For U.S. Senate On June 1 Ballot

Less Than 350 Eligible to Vote in County-Wide Run-Off Saturday

Granville County may establish some kind of election day record on Saturday.

There is to be a run-off primary election with two Republican candidates for U. S. Senate in the race.

Election Board Chairman John N. Watkins Jr. said polls would open at 8:30 a.m. in 19 Granville County voting precincts and voters registered as Republican party members will have opportunity within a 12-hour period ending at 8:30 p.m. to choose between J. L. (Larry) Zimmerman and Robert Vance Somers as their candidates for U. S. Senate.

The winner will oppose Senator Sam J. Erwin, Democratic nominee, in the November general election.

There are in the county 335 registered Republicans, with some precincts having none.

As usual, the votes will be telephoned to the office of Sheriff J. C. Cash, election returns headquarters, as rapidly as they become available shortly after the 8:30 p.m. closing.

Old-timers here were unable to recall a run-off primary in Granville in which only Republicans were participating. Until recent years, Republicans nominated their candidates in convention.

In the primary election May 4, Republicans voted 107 in the contest for Governor.

Billy Seate Gets Board Endorsement

Oxford Methodist Church has given endorsement to one of its members as a candidate for the ministry. He is Billy Seate, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Seate, who has been recommended by the quarterly conference of the Oxford Church for a local license to preach.

Seate, who has completed work for his degree at University of North Carolina, plans to enter the Divinity School of Duke University in September. In January, he will become eligible for a license by Durham District of the Methodist Conference.

Seate was recently married to Miss Wanda Kay Smith of Durham. They make their home in Durham where Mr. Seate is connected with a food chain.

HEW Rejects Granville Plan for Desegregation of Schools

Granville In Bottom Quarter of Average Per Capita Earnings

Person and Vance Top Granville with Franklin County in Rank Immediately Below Granville—Results of Tax Study Revealed

The State Department of Tax Research Tuesday released results of a study showing estimates of county personal income for 1966. The report is similar to those issued after completion of studies of income for the years 1958 and 1962.

The report reveals that both total and per capita personal income reached new highs for North Carolina in 1966. Total income was up 36 per cent over the level attained in 1962. Per capita income rose 21 per cent during the four-year interval.

The report for Granville is based on an estimated population of 35,277 for 1966, and estimates total personal income at \$52,331,000 and per capita income at \$1,463, giving the county a rank of 76, 24th from the bottom, and just above Franklin County, with a population base of 28,292 and per capita income of \$1,479.

Vance County had an estimated average per capita income of \$1,634 and a total of \$22,667,000 on a population base of 34,168.

Person County topped both Granville and Vance with an estimated average income of \$1,698, earning a rank of 58, and a total estimated income of \$48,387,000 on a population base of 28,576.

Adcock began work in 1956 with W. A. Adams Co., with duties in the office of the Oxford concern.
