Whereas, by the death of Col. John A. Lillington, senator elect, a vacancy now exists in this Senatorial District, and to supply which a new election has been ordered on the 19th Oct. next. Therefore,

Resolved, That the Whigs of Davie, still cherishing an undiminished attachment for their principles, will use all honorable efforts to maintain their ascendancy in this County and District.

Resolved, That in order to promote unity and harmony, delegates appointed by this meeting to meet others from Rowan, in convention in Salisbury, the 30th inst., to select a Whig candidate for this Senatorial District.

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves to support the nominee of said convention.

After the adoption of the foregoing Resolutions, the meeting was agreeably addressed by brief and highly eloquent addresses from Col. H. L. Roberts and Maj. G. A. Miller, replete with sound political argument, and pure Whig doctrine.

On motion, the Chair appointed the following gentlemen Delegates viz: Maj. S. A. Hobson, Dr. J. F. Martin, Stephen Douthit, G. W. Johnson, James Brock, Isaac Holman, B. Bailey, Esqrs., Col. T. M. Young and Col. Saml. Taylor.

Arrival of the U. S. Mail Steam Ship United States.

TWO WEEKS LATER FROM CALIFORNIA. New Orleans, Sept. 23.

The U. S. Mail Steam Ship United States from Aspinwall, Sept. 16th, has arrived at this port, bringing \$20,000 specie on freight, and San Francisco dates of the 1st inst. The California news is devoid of interest. The accounts from the mining districts were very favorable. The election pretty much obscured public attention.

The Steam Ship *George Lee* was to have left Aspinwall on the 17th inst. for New York, with 800 passengers and \$1,900,000 in gold, brought down by the steamer *Jno. L. Stephens*.

Advised from Acapulco, of Sept. 5th, state that Alvarez had entered the city of Ayutla, and intended to march through Guerrero upon the city of Mexico. It was reported that the insurgents had been unsuccessful in two encounters, but the Government troops continued to retreat upon the capital.

The Yellow Fever.

New Orleans, Sept. 24.

The deaths from yellow fever at the Charity Hospital during the past week, have been 150. The deaths average 50 per day in this city.

At the last accounts, the disease was raging badly at Galveston, Texas.

Savannah, Sept. 20.

The interments on Friday were 20, and on Saturday 19. There is no falling off in the number of new cases of yellow fever.

San Francisco Markets.

San Francisco Sept. 1.

During the fortnight, Flour has improved in value, and *Gallego* is quoted at \$12.50 per bbl. Bacon was steady at 13c. per lb. *Mess Pork* was worth \$13.50 per cwt. Lard was worth 12c. per lb. *Whiskey* has declined to 20c. per gallon.

Cotton was dull to-day and tending downward. *Spirits of Turpentine* was dull and declining. *Crude* was held at \$4.87 1/2 per bbl. Common *Rosin* was firm and prices advancing. *Breadstuffs* were slightly better.

The Cholera at Pittsburg.

Pittsburg, Sept. 22.

The cholera is making awful ravages in this city. There have been five hundred deaths during the last eight days.

TIMELY RESUSCITATION.—A few days since on Bowman Creek, two miles from Benton Station, on the Covington and Lexington Railroad, a number of men were engaged in digging a well. After making a blast in the bottom of the well (about thirty feet deep) a man descended, and immediately fell. A third descended and he too was struck with the noxious gas. To all appearance the three men were dead. It happened that a man was going by with a cask of water on a sled, and recollecting that he had heard it said that a stream of water poured into a well would dispel the noxious gas, he drove up and poured the water from the cask into the well. The effect was instantaneous. The men were immediately revived and taken out with every prospect of recovery. The fact is important, and ought to be generally known.—*Cincinnati Gazette*.

He has been successful in tracing every share of the over issued stock to the first hands, and we learn that over nine thousand of these fraudulently issued shares are still in the possession of the parties to whom they were made over by Mr. Schuyler, the innocent holders never once supposing they were the recipients of fraudulent stock. The number of fraudulent shares discovered exceeds seventeen thousand. It is for the stockholders to say—as they will at their next meeting—what shall become of them, and whether any compromise shall be made or not.
