LOCAL DEPARTMENT.

We learn that the Town Schools were opened on Tuesday last, under competent instructors.

Most of the speeches at the late pow-wow were of a standard character; that is, they were fully up to the Radical standard, of bitter partizan abuse and low invective, and illustrated the teachings of the Standard.

We chronicle with regret the death of our esteemed townsman, C. N. Price, Esq., on Tuesday last. Mr. Price was an old and respected citizen, and leaves a bereaved family and many friends to mourn their loss.

OUR MERCHANTS.—Conversing with a gentleman from New York a few days since, he remarked that the merchants of Salisbury were more solvent, prompt and reliable, than those of almost any other town in the State. A well merited compliment.

STOCKHOLDERS' MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Stockholders of the North Carolina Railroad is now in progress here. Considerable interest and excitement attended it yesterday by reason of the question of Consolidation with the Atlantic Road, and the interest growing out of that.

There is a conflict between Governor Holden and C. L. Harris, the Superintendent of Public Works. The latter contends that he is entitled to act as State's Proxy, and he is in favor of consolidation. The Governor maintains that he is entitled to appoint the Proxy, and being opposed to consolidation he has appointed a Proxy of the same sentiments, to wit, Byron Laffin.

Holden has got out an injunction against Harris to restrain him from acting as proxy. Harris has also got out an injunction against Holden and Laffin, to restrain them, but has not yet succeeded in finding an officer to serve the writ. The fight is amusing. The Courts will have to decide it; but for the present Holden will triumph, and this will kill consolidation.

The most spicy part of yesterday's proceedings was the skinning given to Laffin, by J. Turner, because Laffin voted in a matter in which himself was interested. That was rich. We will give a fuller account of the proceedings in our next issue. The meeting will no doubt adjourn to-day.

OUR MAYOR.—HOW HE CONSERVES THE PUBLIC PEACE.—On Monday as the Radical procession was marching through Main Street a rich side show, or rather tail show, was exhibited in connection with it. The procession proper was composed of about three hundred negroes and just thirteen white (on the outside) men. A mischievous and humorous town lad, to give the thing a suitable appendage and complete the tout ensemble, mounted a diminutive donkey himself and hired a jolly dandy to mount another donkey of like proportions, and these two, thus mounted and equipped, brought up the rear of the column.

This laughable incident, which put everybody else in good humor, greatly excited the ire of our Lord Mayor, who was master of ceremonies and marched in front. The Mayor evidently considered that a jackass in front was enough; and that he was in danger of being eclipsed by two donkeys in the rear. Accordingly he vindicated his right to the sole Jackasshood of the procession, by ordering some negroes to pitch into the two donkey riders in the rear and thrash them out! If he wished to break up that part of the show, he might easily have done it by a simple order of his own to those two riders. But he preferred to order negroes to pitch into them, as aforesaid.

The negroes obeyed him, and with much violence fell upon the two quiet and good humored donkey riders, creating much disturbance, breaking the peace, and stirring up a sharp row. The riders and donkeys were all knocked down and otherwise roughly treated.

The Mayor is supposed to be the chief peace officer of the Town. This is the way he keeps the peace. We beg the Mayor not to be so jealous-minded. He need not fear that ten jackasses of that size and shape can outshine himself!

THE CASE OF MRS. POLLARD.

Upon the application of Dr. G A Moore, for an assault upon whom Mrs. Pollard was sentenced, on Monday last, to thirty days imprisonment in jail, Judge Gilmer was induced on Wednesday last to reconsider judgment. The case being one of common assault, and the provision of the code allowing compromise at the instance of the party assaulted, and at his solicitation and upon the concurrence and prayer of the State's attorney, A. Leo Knott, Esq. (Mr Whitney assisting,) the sentence was modified by the court to a fine of one hundred dollars and costs, in place of imprisonment. The visitors of the jail had also joined in the application. The fine was promptly paid and Mrs. Pollard was released.—Sun.

AN UNHONORED PRESIDENT.—General Grant, as a military man inspired much public enthusiasm, but, as President, he very soon ceased to inspire any whatever. His recent tour through the country from Washington to Boston was without parallel in not being marked by a single public display in his honor. We have had many Presidents, some not popular ones, but never before in the history of the country did a President make a journey of hundreds of miles without receiving evidences of the public estimation in which the occupant of the highest office in the nation is held.

The neglect with which Grant was treated was just, but we regret that he deserved it. Louisville Journal.

FLORIDA STATE FINANCES.—Official information from Florida regarding the condition of the State finances has been received, contradicting the statements recently published that the State is bankrupt. The following extract from a private letter on the subject confirms the contradiction: "In the first place the Gleason-Osborn dynasty, whatever that was, never issued any bonds, and consequently there was no interest on them to repudiate; in the second place the State Treasury, so far from being bankrupt is in a better condition than it has been for years, and is promptly paying the interest on all State bonds. The interest on the State bonds falling due on the 1st ult. is now being paid in New York by the financial agents of the State."

The death of Hilderbrand, the Missouri outlaw, is reported. He is said to have been the murderer of 80 persons. His death will deprive somebody of \$10,000 reward, which was offered for his capture.

The disease, known to the ancients as leprosy, is making sad havoc among the inhabitants of the Sandwich Islands. This scourge attacks old, middle aged and young of both sexes. In one group may be seen an aged woman, stalwart man in the prime of life, the girl in her teens, the schoolboy and child of four years of age, all bearing the distinctive and never to be forgotten marks of leprosy. The ears of one are swollen, another's hands are deformed the fingers being drawn into the palms of the hands and one or more joints gone from each finger, while another's face is so swollen and disfigured that his own friends find it hard to recognize him. There is no cure for his horrible affliction. Its victims are all sent to an island devoted entirely to their occupation, and are compelled to remain there for life.

A "director's car" has been recently put on the Hartford and New Haven road, which is quite a curiosity in its way. The machinery which propels it is entirely concealed from view, and as it moves along the rails is an object of great curiosity. It is about a quarter the length of an ordinary passenger car, has four wheels like a coach, and the inside is elegantly furnished.

A woman has been arrested in Cambridge, Mass., for whipping her stepson, a boy of six years to death.

Miss Garrett has passed the second examination for the degree of doctor of medicine in the University of Paris.

Kentucky towns refuse to license negro beer sellers, but reserve the employment for the superior race.

The contractors on the Little Rock railroad want 1,000 laborers and mechanics and will pay from two to five dollars a day.

The "Czar of Russia has ordered a naval squadron, under the command of Vice Admiral Erbenstoff, to visit the ports of the United States.
