MEETING AT TROY.

In accordance with a previous notice, a large Mass Meeting of the citizens of Montgomery county, was held at the court house in Troy, for the purpose of taking into consideration the condition of the country, and having some action thereon.

On motion of E. G. L. Barringer, Ivory Luther Esq. was called to the chair, and W. McAlister, E. G. L. Barringer, W. Lipiter and Noah Avman, were appointed Vice Presidents, and J. I. Spencer and D. C. McAnley requested to act as Secretaries.

The President explained the object of the meeting in a few very appropriate remarks, and appointed a committee of eight to draft resolutions expressive of the sentiments of the people, to wit: B. F. Lommen, D. C. McAnley, A. P. Beach, James B. Bartin, John Mullinix, J. W. Keen and Naill McMorris.

On motion, P. C. Sanders, E. H. Davis and Wm. Haywood were appointed a committee to wait on and request Col. O. H. Dockery, who happened to be present, to address the meeting. Col. Dockery came forward and entertained the people for one hour in a very able and eloquent speech, advising the people to conciliation and submission. He was frequently applauded, and was listened to with very marked attention.

At the conclusion of Col. Dockery's speech, the Committee, through their chairman B. F. Simmons submitted the following:

We the undersigned committee appointed to draft resolutions to express the wishes of the people of Montgomery County, beg leave to submit the following report:

Whereas the late rebellion against the United States, has been crushed and as a consequence the State Government of the late rebel States are declared extinct, to the end therefore that civil Government may be established, Be it Resolved, by the citizens of the county of Montgomery in Mass Meeting assembled, that we pledge ourselves to be law abiding and loyal to the government of the United States; that we will maintain and support protect and defend the Constitution and the Union of the United States of America, the laws passed or to be passed by the Government thereof; and that we will not use military power in the preservation of good order, and the suppression of disloyalty to the Government of the United States.

Resolved, That laying aside former political differences, and now and forever branding secession as treason, we will ever hereafter regard the United States of America as one and inseparable.

Resolved, That we regard a further continuance of hostilities, as treason against the Government of the United States, and we beseech our fellow citizens to return to the employment of peaceful pursuits.

Resolved, That we deplore the assassination of Abraham Lincoln late President of the United States, as a National calamity, and we trust that the perpetrators may be brought to a severe and merited punishment.

Resolved, That President Johnson has our sympathy in the administration of the affairs of the National Union, and that we will give to him our cordial support, hoping that he will adopt a just and conciliatory policy towards the States of the South.

Resolved, That we hurry secession forever beneath the ruins of the war, and that we will have for the future but one National Government, one Constitution and one flag, over the limits of the great United States of America, which shall ever be one and inseparable.

Resolved, That we the people of the county of Montgomery, having implicit confidence in the conservatism patriotism and ability of Gen. Alfred Dockery, do hereby recommend him as a candidate for our next Governor of North Carolina.

On motion the resolutions were unanimously adopted. It was moved that the Secretaries furnish a copy of these proceedings to the Salisbury "Union Banner," with a request that other papers in the State copy.

On motion the meeting adjourned.

HEAD-QUARTERS, POST, SALISBURY, N. C., May 21, 1865.

General Order, No. 21. FOR the purpose of maintaining good order in the town and preventing disease, it is ordered: I. All places of business will be closed at 7 o'clock p. m. Citizens and passed retail dealers are prohibited from congregating on the streets; such persons will not be disturbed so long as they shall conduct themselves in an orderly and quiet manner.

II. The streets and alleys will be thoroughly cleaned immediately, and all citizens are also required to have their private grounds thoroughly cleaned. All refuse of any description will be immediately removed to some place designated by the Provost Marshal, and will be removed, not be allowed to accumulate. This paragraph will be strictly observed by all citizens, as the health of both citizens and soldiers depends upon its rigid enforcement.

III. All citizens having arms, accoutrements, ammunition or stores of any kind belonging to the Rebel Government are required to report the same immediately to the Provost Marshal. Non-compliance with this order will subject the offender to punishment. By command of CHAS. H. BUTTERFIELD, Lt. Col. Commanding Post.
