The patients in the Hospital are comfortable and doing well. Most of the Confederate sick and wounded have been sent to their homes. Out of ninety-seven here when the U. S. authorities occupied the town but thirteen have died which speaks well for the kindness of the treatment which they have received. The Hospital is under the charge of Surg. W. Morrow Beach, assisted by Asst. Surgeons Spain and Cowart.

THE AMNESTY OATH.

Circular from the State Department. Washington, May 31.—The following official circular has just been issued:

DEPARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, May 26, 1865.

Sir—A copy of the President's Amnesty Proclamation of this date is herewith appended. By a clause in the instrument the Secretary of State is directed to establish rules and regulations for administering and recording the amnesty oath, so as to insure its benefits to the people, and guard the Government against fraud. Pursuant to this injunction you are informed that the oath prescribed in the proclamation may be taken and subscribed before any commissioned officer, civil, military or naval, in the service of the United States, or any civil or military officer of a loyal State or Territory, who by the laws thereof may be qualified for administering oaths.

All officers who receive such oaths are hereby authorized to give certified copies thereof to the persons, respectfully, by whom they were made; and such officers are hereby required to transmit the originals of such oaths, at as early a day as may be convenient, to this Department, where they will be deposited and remain in the archives of the Government. A register thereof will be kept in the department, and on ap-

plication, in proper cases, certificates will be issued of such records in the customary form of official certificates.

HEAD-QUARTERS, POST, SALISBURY, N. C. May 9, 1865. General Orders, No. 2.

FOR the purpose of maintaining good order in the town and preventing disease, it is ordered:

I. All places of business will be closed at 7 o'clock, p. m. Citizens and paroled rebel soldiers are prohibited from congregating on the streets; such persons will not be disturbed so long as they shall conduct themselves in an orderly and quiet manner.

II. The streets and ways will be thoroughly policed immediately, and all citizens are also required to have their private grounds thoroughly policed.

All affid of any description will be immediately removed to some place designated by the Provost Marshal, and will hereafter not be allowed to accumulate. This paragraph will be strictly observed by all citizens, as the health of both citizens and soldiers depends upon its rigid enforcement.

III. All citizens having arms, accoutrements, ammunition or stores of any kind belong, to the Rebel Government are required to report the same immediately to the Provost Marshal. Non-compliance with this order will subject the offender to punishment.
