Checking Perspiration—Facts Which Everybody Ought to Know.

Edward Everett became overheated in testifying in a court room, went to Faneuil Hall, which was cold, sat in a draft of air until his turn came to speak: "but my hands and feet were ice, my lungs on fire. In this condition I had to go and spend three hours in the court room." He died in less than a week from thus checking the perspiration. It was enough to kill any man.

Professor Mitchell, while in a state of perspiration in yellow fever, the certain sign of recovery, left his bed, went into another room, became chilled in a moment and died the same night.

If while perspiring, or while warmer than usual from exercise or heated room, there is a sudden exposure to still, cold air, to raw, damp atmosphere, or to a draught, whether at an open window or door, or street corner, the inevitable result is a violent and instantaneous closing of the pores of the skin, by which waste and impure matter, which were making their way out of the system, are compelled to seek an exit through some weaker part. The idea is presented by saying that the cold had settled in that part.

To illustrate:
A lady was about getting into a small boat to cross the Delaware; but wishing first to get an orange at a fruit-stand, she ran up the banks of the river, and on her return to the boat found herself much heated, for it was summer; but there was a little wind on the water and her clothes soon felt cold, which settled on her lungs, and within the year she died of consumption.

A strong man was working in a garden in May, feeling rather tired about noon, he sat down in the shade of the house and fell asleep; he woke up chilly, inflammation of the lungs followed, ending, after two years of great suffering in consumption. On opening his chest there was such an extensive decay; that the yellow matter was scooped out by the cupful.

A lady, after being unusually busy all day, found herself heated and tired towards sundown of a summer's day. She concluded to take a drive to town in an open vehicle. The ride made her uncomfortably cool, but she warmed herself up by an hours shopping, when she turned homeward; it being late in the

evening she found herself more decidedly chilly than before. At midnight she had pneumonia (inflammation of the lungs,) and in three months she had the ordinary symptoms of confirmed consumption.

A young lady rose from her bed on a November night, and leaned her arm on the cold window sill, to listen to a serenade. Next morning she had pneumonia, and suffered the horrors of asthma for a long life.

Multitudes of women loose health and life every year, in one or more ways, by busying themselves in a warm kitchen until weary, and then throwing themselves on a bed or sofa, without covering, and perhaps in a room without fire; or by removing the out-clothing, and perhaps change the dress for a common one, as they entered the house after a walk or a shopping. The rule should be invariably to go at once into a warm room and keep on all the clothing for at least five or ten minutes, until the forehead is perfectly dry. In all weathers, if you have to walk and ride on any occasion, do the riding first.

I HAVE divided this collection district into divisions as follows: 1st division to include Anson and Union counties; 2d do Stanly and Cabarrus; 3d do Rowan; 4th do Davidson; 5th do Davie and Yadkin; 6th do Forsythe and Stokes; 7th do Surry, Alleghany and Ash; 8th do Wilkes; 9th do Iredell; 10th do Mecklenburg; 11th do Gaston and Lincoln; 12th do Catawba and Alexander; 13th do Cleveland; 14th do Rutherford, Polk and McDowell; 15th do Burke and Caldwell; 16th do Watauga, Yancey and Mitchell; 17th do Buncombe and Madison; 18th do Henderson and Transylvania; 19th do Haywood and Jackson; 20th do Macon, Cherokee and Clay.

I will consider the application of any loyal, energetic, business man, who may reside inside the several divisions indicated above for Assistant Assessor of the same; provided he can take and subscribe the following oath prescribed by act of Congress, July 1862:

I, of County of and State of do solemnly swear that I have never voluntarily borne arms against the United States since I have been a citizen thereof; that I have voluntarily given no aid, countenance, counsel, or encouragement to persons engaged in armed hostility thereto; that I have neither sought, nor accepted, nor attempted to exercise the functions of any office whatever, under any authority, or pretended authority, in hostility to the United States; that I have not yielded a voluntary support to any pretended government, authority, power, or constitution, within the United States, hostile or inimical thereto. And I do further swear, to the best of my knowledge and ability, I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I will take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter; So help me God.

All applicants must write their christian name or names in full, otherwise they will not receive notice. All persons who were doing any business in this district on the 30th day of May, 1865, for which a license is required, will be assessed from the 1st day of May, 1865. All persons who have commenced any business for which a license is required since the date of the establishment of the district, to wit: the 30th day of May, 1865, will be assessed from the date of commencement of said business.

Any person, firm, company, or corporation, desiring to engage in, prosecute, or carry on any trade, business, or profession in this district must first obtain a license therefore provided by law.

Special attention is directed to section 53 to 70, to 71 to 78, and 116 to 123, inclusive, of the internal revenue act approved June 30th, 1864, as amended by the act of March 3 1865, relative to spirits, ale, beer and porter, and licenses.

The necessary blank applications prescribed by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue for licenses can be had at my office.

No manufactured tobacco, snuff, or cigars, nor distilled spirits, brandy or wine, can be shipped out of the district unless in accordance with law.

The income tax for 1864 will be assessed in this district.
