## GENERAL NEWS.

Horace Greeley has written a letter to the N. Carolina Negroes, in which he says: "Be hopeful. Be patient. Be diligent. Respect yourselves, and STAY WHERE YOU BELONG."

The Wynne Reyner Trial has been closed in Richmond and Mr. John M. Reyner, was fined \$50 or sixty days in jail for his assault on Mr. Charles H. Wynne, editor of the Times.

Miss Sallie Partington, has retired from the stage.

Crop estimates claim much attention; and the leading authority in the London Times sums up his estimates throughout the country as follows:

Wheat will yield twenty six bushels per acre, or four below the average. Barley thirty two bushels per acre, or eight below the average. Oats thirty four bushels per acre, or fourteen below the average. Peas and beans will yield their average crop. Potatoes will yield unusually well. Hay will give an average crop. Pasturage is singularly abundant.

A recent letter from General Lee, President of Washington College, to Judge Brockborough, states that he will be in Lexington on the 20th instant, to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees to be held on that day; and that he will enter upon the duties of his office at the opening of the session.

Kentucky has been Democratic by 3,492 in a Congressional vote. The Senate will stand 1 Union and 19 Opposition, and the House of Representatives 58 Opposition and 42 Union.

The Alabama state convention assembled at Montgomery on the 12th. Ex-Senator Benjamin Fitzpatrick, was elected President. The convention is largely composed of Union men and all seem anxious to get back into the Union. On the 15th the Convention by a vote of forty-eight to thirty-four voted against the repudiation of the State debt.

By the 1st of October, it is thought, communication by rail between Charleston and Columbia will be restored.

The rice crop in South Carolina is said to be fair.

A young sister of Maggie Mitchell made her & only appearance on the stage, at the debut of her sister the other evening, in Cincinnati.

A man in Williamsburg, N. Y., rid himself of a scolding wife by placing her in an insane asylum.

The new hotel in St. Louis cost a million and a quarter.

A lady in Oregon, Mo., has been arrested for beating her husband to death.

The Empress Eugenia has a volume of poems in press.

John A. Bingham and C. L. Vandigham are candidates for the United States Senate, from Ohio.

General Fremont intends to make his permanent residence in Missouri.

Late arrivals from Arkansas report all quiet.

Le Baron de Dieulefit Rear Admiral of France is on a visit to New York.

The latest news from Brazil indicates a more vigorous prosecution of hostilities against Paraguay. The late rains had impeded military operations, but large armies were being raised by volunteering and conscription, and hostilities were soon to be resumed upon a more imposing scale.

The French fleet had left Portsmouth after a very successful round of fetes.

The most important items of news from the continent are the resignation of the Count Walewski as Senator; the announcement by the Paris Patrie that the French Imperial Government will in no event give its approval to the Austro-Prussian compact; and the formation of a new Portugal Ministry under Viscount De Castro.

The time for the disinterment and removal of the remains of Union soldiers buried in the Department of Virginia, is fixed for the first of October. Should there be any Federal troops near the places of disinterment, it is understood that Government wagons will be furnished for the removal of the bodies to the nearest railroad or steamboat points.

Ex Senator H. N. Rice has been nominated by the Democracy of Minnesota for Governor of that State.

A bold and systematic attempt was made at Troy, on Wednesday of last week to flood the town with counterfeit one hundred dollar Treasury notes. Quite a number of them were successfully passed, although it is said the notes may be easily detected.

The colored folks of Fortress Monroe, Norfolk, Portsmouth and Richmond are getting up, by subscriptions a "magnificent sword" for General Butler, to be presented as a testimony of their high appreciation of his distinguished services in the field.

A young lady of Chicago, hardly seventeen years of age, but very handsome and "an heiress of great expectations," with twenty thousand dollars already in her own right, left the parental roof on Tuesday morning last, to follow her lover in Wisconsin, whom the old folks had discarded. Chicago is enjoying quite a "sensation" over the little domestic affair.

In the mandamus case in Montgomery County, Maryland, testing the constitutionality of the Registry law in that State, by agreement of counsel the Judge dismissed the petition from which decision an appeal was taken. The Appellate Court will not decide it.

The capitalists of the Atlantic and Great Western Railroad, who have obtained the controlling stock in the New York and Erie, and Ohio and Mississippi Railways, have declared

their intention of double tracking the whole line from New York to St. Louis. This will be a work of great magnitude and when completed will have due effect on travel and transportation east and west.

The Atlanta (Georgia) Intelligencer, in speaking of the improvements now going forward in that city, says that it would be difficult to convince any man of their extent and magnitude who was not actually there to see them.

Major Wilson, late of the Seventh Louisiana Regiment, has left Richmond for New Orleans, where he intends to use every effort in order to charter a vessel for the purpose of enabling Louisianians, now residing in Virginia, whose pecuniary circumstances prevent them from returning, to secure a free passage to the old Pelican State. It is proposed to raise a fund for this purpose from among the merchants of New Orleans.

## TO THE PUBLIC.

3rd Collection District, Salisbury N. C., Sept. 1st, 1865.

AGREEABLY to instructions from the Internal Revenue Office, I have re-divided this Collection District into divisions, as follows: 1st division to include Anson, Union, Cabarrus and Stanly counties; 2d do. Rowan, Davidson and Davie; 3d do. Yadkin, Forsyth; Stokes and Surry; 4th do. Mecklenburg, Gaston and Lincoln; 5th do. Catawba, Iredell and Alexander; 6th do. Wilkes, Ashe, Allegany and Watauga; 7th do. Cleveland, Rutherford and Polk; 8th do. Caldwell, Burke, Mitchell and McDowell; 9th do. Yancey, Madison, Buncombe, Henderson and Haywood; 10th do. Transylvania, Jackson, Macon, Cherokee and Clay.

All persons who were doing any business in this district on the 30th day of May, 1865, for which a license is required, will be assessed from the 1st day of May, 1865. All persons who have commenced any business for which a license is required since the date of the establishment of the district, to wit; the 30th day of May, 1863, will be assessed from the date of commencement of said business.

Any person, firm, company, or corporation, desiring to engage in, prosecute, or carry on any trade, business, or profession in this district must first obtain a license therefore provided by law.

Especial attention is directed to section 53 to 70, to 71 to 78, and 116 to 123, inclusive, of the internal revenue act approved June 30th, 1864, as amended by the act of March 3 1865, relative to spirits, ale, beer and porter, and licenses.

The necessary blank applications prescribed by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue for Licences can be had at my office.

No manufactured tobacco, snuff, or cigars, nor distilled spirits, brandy or wine, can be shipped out of the district unless in accordance with law.

The income tax for 1864 will be assessed in this district.
