Hon J. Warren Merrill, Mayor of Cambridge, Mass., has given \$10,000 to Waterville College, to endow the professorship of Natural History and Chemistry. The Trustees of the College have voted to name the professorship after the donor. Waterville College has received \$100,000 during the past year.

Rev. M. J. Oram, a chaplain of the army, writes from Richmond to the *Christian Advocate*, that he met Dr. Edwards, of the Methodist Church, South who, in response to a suggestion that the chaplain should preach in the church, said: "This cannot be done. The chasm between us and the Church North is too great to be thus easily bridged over. I fully and sacredly believe in the divinity of slavery; and if I were to be called to appear before my judge, Jesus Christ, the next hour, I would, without any mental reservation whatever, preach up the divinity of slavery. It has divine sanction in the Holy Scriptures."

We learn from the Rio Grande border, that the French troops have been withdrawn from that line, and natives put in their places. The reason of this, is said to be the disposition of the French officers to give and take offence. Baron De Bruar, who wrote an insulting letter to our Gen. Brown, has been dismissed.

Seth Kinman, the Rocky Mountain trapper, has constructed and presented to President Johnson a "grizzly chair." The four legs, with the feet and claws in perfection, are those of a huge grizzly bear, while the arms, are the arms and paws of another grizzly; the back and sides are also ornamented with immense claws. The seat is soft and exceedingly comfortable, but the great feature of the "institution" is, that by touching a cord, the head of a monster grizzly bear, with distended jaws, will dart in front from under the seat, snapping and gnashing its teeth as natural as life. The presentation came off at the White House one day last week.

An interesting trial took place in Ravenna last week, under the Ohio liquor law. A returned soldier named Greer, while in a state of intoxication, was robbed of \$102 by some unknown persons. His wife brought suit for damages against the saloon-keeper who sold him the liquor, and obtained a verdict in her favor of \$120.

The receipts of treasure at San Francisco, from different sources, during the first six months of this year were \$29,225,006; of which amount California and Nevada contributed \$25,671,782. The product of gold and silver mines on the Pacific coast, for the first six months of last year, was estimated at \$28,000,000; so we have here an increase of \$1,225,006, while the increase this year over the same period in 1863, is \$3,581,989.

The export of specie for the past eight months, has been only \$20,000,009. We are mining gold and silver at the rate of \$80,000,000 a year. *The Tribune* thinks that the "child is born who will see our annual product of gold and silver greater than all our exports of all commodities for any past year."

A fight between a bull and a panther came off near Monterey, a few weeks since, on which many bets were made by the Mexicans. The panther made a spring, alighting on the neck of the bull, seized him by the throat, and held on until the latter fell down exhausted with fatigue, fright, and loss of blood, and then soon put an end to the contest by tearing open the bull's throat in a most dreadful manner.

The newest thing out is "plumpers" for hollow checked catfish. The plumper is made of porcelain, pear-shaped in form, flat on one side and bulging out on the other. They fit on the inside of the checks, giving a round, plump appearance; hence doubtless their name.

CONSPIRATORS AT THE DRY TORTUGAS.—A letter from the Dry Tortugas denies that Dr. Mudd was assigned to duty as an assistant surgeon, and adds:

Dr. Mudd was ordered to report to the surgeon in charge of the prison hospital. He then had orders to report to Wardmaster Hurd, (161st New York Infantry) of prison hospital, for duty as nurse, in place of nurse Thomas, whose sentence has expired. Spangler and O'Laughlin, the latter being a carver by trade, were immediately assigned to duty in the engineer department as carpenters. Arnold is not in good health, and is writing for the Provost Marshal.

A building formerly used as a powder mill near Marshalls, Texas, was recently blown up, and with it four men belonging to the 8th Illinois regiment, who were terribly burned and wounded. Two of them, named Davis and Little, lingered in excruciating pain until the following morning when they died.—The other two, named Grate and Algood, will recover.

SECRETARY OF THE U. S. SENATE.—It is said that Mr. John C. Ten Eyck, of New Jersey, is a candidate for the office of secretary of the United States Senate, in place of Mr. Forney, who desires to secure the United States Senatorship for Pennsylvania. ## TO THE PUBLIC.

3rd Collection District, Salisbury N. C., Sept. 1st, 1865.

AGREEABLY to instructions from the Internal Revenue Office, I have re-divided this Collection District into divisions as follows: 1st division to include Anson, Union, Cabarrus and Stanly counties; 2d do. Rowan, Davidson and Davie; 3d do. Yadkin, Forsyth, Stokes and Surry; 4th do. Mecklenburg, Gaston and Lincoln; 5th do. Catawba, Iredell and Alexander; 6th do. Wilkes, Ashe, Alleghany and Watauga; 7th do. Cleveland, Rutherford and Polk; 8th do. Caldwell, Burke Mitchell and McDowell; 9th do. Yancey, Madison, Buncomb, Henderson and Haywood; 10th do. Transylvania, Jackson, Macon, Cherokee and Clay.

All persons who were doing any business in this district on the 30th day of May, 1865, for which a license is required, will be assessed from the 1st day of May, 1865. Persons who have commenced any business since the 30th day of May, 1865, will be assessed from the date of commencement of said business.

Any person, firm, company, or corporation, desiring to engage in, prosecute, or carry on any trade, business, or profession in this district must first obtain a license thereto provided by law.

Special attention is directed to section 53 to 70, to 71 to 78, and 116 to 123, inclusive, of the internal revenue act approved June 30th, 1864, as amended by the act of March 3 1865, relative to spirits, ale, beer, and porter, and licenses.

The necessary blank applications prescribed by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, for licenses can be had at my office.

No manufactured tobacco, snuff, or cigars, nor distilled spirits, brandy or wine, can be shipped out of the district unless in accordance with law.

The income tax for 1864 will be assessed in this district.
