GENERAL NEWS.

of London and the New York, from Queenstown on the 9th, have arrived. The Shenandoah had arrived in the Mersey and had been delivered to the authorities. Her commander, Waddell, states that the first information he received of the close of the war was on the 30th of August.

Liverpool, Nov. 8. Cotton has been flat and very irregular, though American is not quoted as declining, other descriptions are generally quoted one half lower; sales of two days 8000 bales, 2000 to speculators and exporters.

The Star says, if the Shenandoah is claimed by the Government of the United States, there is no reason for refusing the request.

Lord Russell has been installed as Premier, and Lord Clarendon as Foreign Minister.

Washington, Nov. 20. The President has been advised by telegraph that the Florida Convention has annulled the ordinance of secession; abolished slavery; declared no person incompetent to testify as witnesses on account of color in any matter wherein colored persons are concerned; repudiated the Confederate war debt; amended the constitution in other respects and adjourned.

New York, Nov. 18. The Jamaica Standard says that over one thousand and fifty rebels have been hanged. It is probable, too, that before the court martial closes two thousand will suffer death for their attempt to exterminate the whites.

New York, Nov. 18. Cotton steady at 52 a 53 cents. Flour declined 5 to 10 cents. Southern \$9 16 to \$3 30. Wheat declining. Beef steady. Pork quiet. Lard firm. Whisky dull.

Nashville, Nov. 18. The cotton market was active to day, the prices ranging from 40 to 43 cents per pound.

Murder and robbery are of frequent occurrence here.

New York, Nov. 20. Cotton firm, 3000 bales sold at 52 to 53; Naval stores quiet. Gold 146 1/2.

News received states that Maximilian has ordered all his forces to be withdrawn from outposts and concentrated at three points—Vera Cruz, city of Mexico and San Luis Potosi. The Liberals are much comforted at the report that mutual aid will soon reach them.

The Shenandoah has been delivered up to the American Consul and will be sent to N. York.

The Captain and her crew have been unconditionally discharged.

The Hebrews furnished 40,000 soldiers for the Union army in the late war, and they have established asylums for disabled soldiers, widows and orphans at New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis.

The Wheeling Intelligencer says it is not to be disguised that within the State of Virginia there is a reactionary party, not only as regards national politics, but as regards the very existence of the State of West Virginia.

The French Courier, at New York is indignant at the appointment of Gen. Logan as Minister to the Republic of Mexico and pronounces it a provocation. It adds in substance, that the French troops now will not leave Mexico. France is allied with Mexico, now right or wrong, and will maintain the alliance.

Ex-Senator Johnson, of Arkansas, is here seeking restoration of his plantations now in the possession of the Freedmen's Bureau. He had an interview with the officers of the bureau to day, and it is thought that the property will be turned over to him.—Wash. Chronicle.

The first Methodist society in this country was formed in 1766. Now there are in connection, North and South, 8,421 itinerant preachers, 13,205 local do., 1,628,320 members, 101 colleges and academies, and 31,106 students. Next year occurs the centenary celebration.

The President has pardoned Robert Tyler, son of ex President Tyler, and late Assistant Treasurer of the Confederate Government.

The interdict laid on the Episcopal churches of Alabama by the military commandant of that State has been removed by the special order of the President.

The Houston Telegraph of the 10th instant learns that orders have been received in the State from Washington not to muster out of the service any more troops, nor to sell any more Government property until further orders.

Washington, Nov. 17. Our claims against England, the excitement on the Canada frontier the conditional offer of Napoleon to withdraw the French troops from Mexico, and the representation of the Southern States in Congress, are among the subjects discussed at the Cabinet meeting to day. The President's proclamation announcing the restoration of the Southern States to the Union, and their right to full representation in Congress, and also restoring the writ of habeas corpus, will be issued before the end of November.

The Altoona Tribune tells of a girl who was running off to lead a circus life, being pursued by her friends, and who jumped from the train while making thirty miles an hour. The train was stopped and backed, with the expectation of finding her a mutilated corpse, but her crinoline had caught in the wind and saved her from even the slightest injury.

M. Caminade, a Frenchman, recently obtained a patent for his discovery of a substitute for rags in the manufacture of paper, consisting of the root of the Incarn plant, showing, when dried and beaten, thousands of very white fibres which form an excellent paste for paper makers.

A dog and bear fight was produced recently upon the stage of the opera house in Virginia, Nevada. The bear, though a fresh young cub, whipped all the dogs set upon him; and the audience became disgusted, and stopped the fun.
