This angered General Alvarez, who had proclaimed the life of Every captured French or Imperial General as forfeited.

New York, Nov. 18 .- The N. Orleans Times says, in relation to the rumors of naval and military preparations: " We have information that we are not at liberty to disclose, giving positive corrobaration to these rumors, and we hesitate not to prodict that unless the French troops are withdrawn from Mexico before Christmas, there will be active intervention on behalf of the libers als, and the traditional policy of the U.
