At a meeting of the Physicians of Salisbury, held December 6, 1865, the following resolutions were adopted: 1. Resolved, That as every branch of business is now conducted exclusively on the cash system, it becomes necessary for us to require of our patrons prompt cash payment of our bills. That we will as soon as the services are rendered present our bills and expect and require the money.

2. Resolved, That to prevent any misunderstanding, these resolutions be published in the Town papers, together with our Tariff of fees, to commence January 1st, 1866.

Tariff Fees. Visit in Town during the day, \$2 00 Consultation fee, including visit, \$10 00 Visit in the country 3 miles and under, \$3 00 Over 3 miles one dollar a mile in the day. Double these rates at night. Extra charges for Medicine. Consultation fee ten dollars—exclusive of visit. Midwifery 25 to 50 dollars—mileage additional.

Office Prescription, \$2. CASH. Surgical cases, fees in proportion. Resolved, That all bills standing on our books, unsettled January 1st, 1866, will be made out in accordance with the above Tariff of Fees.
