The President, in an interview with the New Hampshire delegation, said in reference to the Convention and his future policy: We have now a policy and principles recognized and laid down by the most inteligent, able and patriotic body of men convened since the days of the Declara tion of Independence. A recognition of this policy and principles would be required of those who receive office and patronage from the Government. It was a duty the Administra-tion owed itself that strength and power should be given to those who maintain the principles declared by that great body of National men who met this week in Convention at Pinladelphia.
