STATE NEWS.

The Lumberton fair will be held November 3rd, 4th and 5th.
The attendance of the Raleigh city schools is ten per cent. greater than ever before.

The sale of cider is prohibited in High Point, that beverage being put on an equal footing with sawpaw.

The cotton mills at Newton, N. C., have begun to run day and night to catch up with accumulated orders.

Stewart Bros., of Winston, have surrendered the paper belonging to the State which they had in their possession.

The portraits of Senator Vance and Judge Shipp have been given honorable place in the new Mecklenburg court house.

Nine new convicts were taken to the penitentiary yesterday. Two of them were from Pitt county and seven from Perquimans county.

A party of 500 excursionists from Winston-Salem, N. C., and vicinity, were received by President McKinley at the White House Wednesday afternoon.

The Charlotte News says the old fashioned whipping post is to be established in Mecklenburg county, as the authorities believe it will be more efficacious than the chain gang.

Washington Messenger: A bear weighing 315 pounds was killed about six miles from town Saturday afternoon last. The hunters from that section say the animal was the largest they have ever seen.

This occurred in Asheville, as witnesseth the Citizen: A man applied to a magistrate today to write a mortgage on two hogs for 25 cents as he desired to get a quarter's worth of whiskey.

It is noticed that from several points in this State quantities of peach seed are being shipped to the north. They have heretofore been thrown away as worthless. They are now used, it is said, in the manufacture of prussic acid.

Robert Stafford, of Guilford county, the best ball player North Carolina has produced, has been drafted in the Louisville National Team and will next year wear the national uniform. He is the heaviest batter in the Western League.

Seven large buildings, with their contents, were burned in the centre of the business part of Detroit, Mich. The loss is estimated at \$700,000. The fire was started on the stage of the Detroit opera house by the explosion of a calcium light. The ten story structure occupied by the Henry R. Leonard furniture company, the jewelry establishment of Wright, Kay & Co., and C. H. Mitchell's cable supply company were among the largest losers. Julia Arthur was playing "A Lady of Quality" when the explosion occurred.

Senator Wolcott is hopeful that the English government will consent to a conference on the money question. Since Wolcott joined hands with McKinley and Mark Hanna it is very natural for him to profess to be hopeful about international bimetalism, but his predictions will not inspire hope in anybody who wants to see bimetalism in this country. They have very little faith in Mr. Wolcott just at present, and none at all in England.—Louisville Dispatch.
