The Beautiful Senorita Escapes.
Havana, Oct. 7.—The beautiful
young Cuban patriot, Senorita
Evangeline Cisneros, heroine of
the sensational adventure with the
Spanish Governor of the Isle of
Pines, has escaped from the Casa
de Recogidas (House of Scraps),
where she had been confined for
several months, on a charge of
conspiracy against the Crown of
Spain, and of an attempt upon the
life of Governor Berez, Governor
of the Isle of Pines.

According to the statements of
the jailers or attendants, she made
her escape some time last night.
This morning's roll-call she was
not in, and when search was
made in the cell she was found
in the room in which she had been confined
had been filed and bent out-
ward. The bar could not have
been moved except by a great out-
lay of strength and all the circum-
stances go to prove the co-opera-
tion of outsiders in her escape.

The authorities have not yet
secured any clue as to the where-
abouts of Senorita Evangeline.
Several of the employes of the
establishment have been arrested.
