TENNESSEE QUARRANTINES.

Ticket Agent Meroney Received a Telegram in Regard to It.

Tennessee has quarrantined again. Last year it quarrantined against yellow fever. This time it quarrantines against small pox and other infectious diseases. Ticket Agent W. R. Meroney,

of this place, received a telegram last night notifying him to warn all persons entering Tennessee to have a certificate of vaccination with them. On failure, they would be stopped. Knoxville, Morristown, Bristol and a number of other towns were named in the telegram as having the quarrantine regulation.

A gentleman going west this morning and having to pass through Tennessee after purchasing his ticket was informed of the law, returned it and procured \$200 worth of hay extra. another by the northern route. Agent W. B. Strachan, of the depot, tells us he has also received a circular in regard to the matter.

The railroad company will not sell Tennessee without telling them of at their own risk.

Profitable Farming.

From 68 acres of cotton, corn, fodder, oats, hay and pork, Mr. Fletcher, of Marlboro, S. C., cleared last year \$1,738.60, or an average net profit of \$25.56 per acre, not counting the proceeds from the dairy, poultry yard, garden, orchard and other minor sources. Each acre in other words, yielded enough profit in one season to buy outright from two to ten acres like it. Thirteen acres of cotton cleared \$472. Thirty-five acres of corn and peas cleared him \$692. Twenty acres of oats and grass cleared \$352. The net profit on the cotton per acre was \$36.61; on the corn and peas was \$19.77; on the oats and hay was \$17.60.



The Governor is still very desirous of leasing the road to the Southern. Whether he will submit another proposition to the Southern is not known.


