HONOR TO HIM.

The name of Constructor Hobson is now being heralded to the public by the newspapers of the day and he is receiving the applauds of the people of the nation. The young Lieutenant ran the Merrimac into the channel at Santiago Friday, as noted in our specials, to sink it in order to obstruct the outlet. The brave hero, that he was, did this in the face of the Spanish fire, having with him seven other soldiers. After accomplishing his purpose he departed with his crew in a small boat to the Spanish man-of-war Cristobal Colon, surrendering himself and men as prisoners. This was a most thrilling deed and one that required great daring and courage.

Mr. Hobson hails from Alabama, but is of North Carolina stock, his ancestors having been residents of this State, he being a nephew of Representative Richmond Pearson, now in Congress.
Honor to him.

—War is the costliest game while it lasts that nations can play. Sometimes wars are more costly after they have ended than they were in waging. Representative Cannon estimates that if the present war shall last a year it will require an outlay of \$600,000,000. This estimate will be made more readily comprehensive by the statement that the expenditure will be at the rate of two million dollars a day for every working day in the year. Our ordinary expenditure for carrying on the civil service, paying pensions, etc., will require another million dollars per diem. The taxpayers have a pretty stiff piece of work cut out for them, no matter how much Congress shall authorize the Treasury to borrow to keep the guns bellowing until the Spaniards shall cry enough.

—There are too many in this world who will not cast their bread upon the water, unless they are assured beforehand that it will come back in a few days a full grown sandwich, all trimmed with ham, buttered and rolled up in a warrantee deed for one half the earth and a mortgage on the other half.

—The work of paying off the troops at Tampa commenced Saturday. Over \$500,000 will be distributed in the next two or three days by eight paymasters who are there.

—The countess de Casa Valencia, who started a Spanish relief fund in London, collected about \$4,000. Among the Spanish sympathizers that subscribed were Count and Countess De Torro Diaz, Countess Heeren, duchess of Cleveland, duchess of Somerset, Blanche, countess of Mayo; Miss Windsor Clive, Mr. and Mrs. John Bryce.

—A commentary on the present craze for military trappings for the purpose of feminine adornment may be found in the reply of a young soldier at Chicamauga whose sister wanted to make up a box for the boys at the front and asked him what she should send. "Dear sister," he wrote, "send me safety pins. I've just met 15 new girls."

—The democratic amendment to the war revenue bill providing for an issue of greenbacks was defeated in the Senate last week. The Senate adopted the substitute authorizing \$300,000,000 of bonds and \$100,000,000 of certificates of indebtedness. The Wolcott amendment providing for the coinage of \$42,000,000 of silver bullion in the treasury was also adopted.

—Lord Wolsey thinks that if this country were at war with one of the first-class powers it might rattle us some at first, but in the long run we would whip any nation in Europe.

A guard has been stationed at the water works during the past week with the object to protect the purity of the supply. While Private A. J. Philips of Co. M. First North Carolina regiment, was on duty about 3 o'clock yesterday morning he saw a man scale the iron fence and approach the reservoir with something in his hand. The command to "halt" was promptly given, but the man did not obey, and a shot from Private Erwin's rifle immediately followed. It apparently did not take effect, however, and the man managed to escape.

The North Carolina boys have been seeing and hearing snakes a good deal lately. They claim that they can hear them singing at night, but it is more likely the singing is that of tree toads. During the still hours of Monday night the call was heard: "Relief wanted for post No. 23." Relief was promptly sent, and the sentinel stated that he had heard snakes crawling in the grass, and he desired to get out of there.

The hospital corps of the North Carolina regiment was out for practice yesterday afternoon and one of the members became greatly frightened. He had just laid the stretcher down on the grass, and then leaned over resting his arm on the ground, when he felt something very soft, and on looking down saw that he was leaning on a big black snake. He is said to have immediately beaten the record for high jumping.

The North Carolina boys are delighted at having been assigned to the Seventh corps under command of General Lee. The same is undoubtedly true as to the other regiments that have been made a part of General Lee's command.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

Telegraphic News Condensed for the Convenience of Hasty Readers.

Samuel Plimsoll, who devised marks to prevent overloading of ships, is dead in England.

Reports from Jamaica state that the Cadiz squadron is due to arrive at Santiago and reinforce Cervera.

Argentine is said to have declined Chili's offer of full and complete arbitration of the boundary dispute.

Twenty Russian soldiers were killed and eighteen wounded by a sudden attack of natives on a fort in Turkistan.

Oregon holds her State election to-day. A Governor and other State officers, and a Legislature will be elected.

A dispatch to the London Daily Telegraph from Gibraltar says the Cadiz squadron is now a week out, and bound for Cuba.

Col. Henry T. Douglas, of Baltimore, an ex-Confederate, was nominated by President McKinley to be a brigadier-general.

Charles H. Myers leaped from a fifth-story window at Baltimore, Saturday, and received injuries from which he died while in a police ambulance.

Twelve thousand troops, under General Shafter, are to be employed against Santiago, 4,000 of whom are said to be already embarked at Tampa.

The grand jury Saturday returned a true bill against Governor Atkinson's wife, charging her with forgery. She was at once taken into court, and held to appear under \$3,000 bond.

The Queen Regent has informed Senor Sagasta that she does not desire to prosecute Senor Emilio Castelar, the Republican statesman, for the article attacking her recently published in The Petite Review Internationale, and reprinted in a leading Madrid paper.

Capt. Charles V. Gridley, commander of the cruiser Olympia and one of the heroes of the brilliant victory at Manila, is dead. Capt. Gridley is the first officer of great prominence whose death is a direct result of the existing war with Spain, having died from the effects of a rupture, supposed to have been received during the battle at Manila.

Advices from Mole, St. Nicholas say that Saturday some distance off Jean Rabel, a seaport on the northwest coast of Hayti, half way between Port de Paix and Mole, St. Nicholas, a combat took place between three Spanish and 4 American ships. The American ships is said to have withdrawn from the combat. The officers of the ships lying at Mole, St. Nicholas were extremely reticent. It is thought possible that the Spanish ships encountered were the vanguard of the Cadiz fleet.
