TO THE CITIZENS OF SALISBURY: I desire to call the attention of the citizens to the fact that the habit of leaving the water spickets open and allowing the water to run all the time so as to prevent the pipes from freezing, is greatly endangering the property of every citizen in town. The pressure in the stand-pipe is so much lessened that in case of fire late at night it would be impossible to get the necessary pressure to control the fire. Besides, with 100 or more spickets open, direct pressure from the pumps will not be sufficient to overcome the trouble. It is earnestly hoped that the citizens will heed this warning, before some disastrous fire occurs and much property destroyed in our town.
