**THE COUNTY REPORT.**

The SUN publishes today the report of the county commissioners with reference to the expenditures for the "poor fund." Much reading matter is unavoidably crowded out on account of the space consumed by this report. All the most important telegraphic news of the day will be found on the first and fourth pages, however.

—We thought we had bugs enough in this country, but the U. S. Government is paying a bugologist \$6,000 a year to hunt up more in the Philippines.

—Andrew Carnegie and Mrs. Leland Stanford head the list of royal givers. Andrew has given to libraries, schools, &c., about \$7,000,000, while Mrs. Stanford has given \$30,000,000 to the Stanford University.

—Hon. Burke Cookran says President Roosevelt could stop the Boer war by raising his finger. But how could President Roosevelt raise his finger to do that, when we are playing the same game in the Philippines that the British are in the Transvaal? asks the Wilmington Star.

—Talking about prize money, Sampson has been paid \$25,797 and expects \$10,000 more when the Maria Teresa case is settled, and Capt. Chadwick, of the New York, has received \$14,028.08, and will get \$4,321.50 more. Neither of these men were present when the Spanish fleet was destroyed. Cook will get \$2,190.32, Clark \$1,989.06, Wainwright \$436.68, Watson \$18.35, Schley \$3,334. The men destroyed the fleet. Dewey, who did more than all, got \$9,570, about one third as much as Sampson. The prize money goes in proportion to his share.

**Money in Circulation**

It is worthy of note that the money circulation of the United States at present is larger than it ever was before. According to a document just sent out by the Treasury Department the "per capita" circulation on July 1, 1901, was \$27.98, or over \$6 more than in 1896. Our stock of money in circulation is \$2,175,387,277 for a population estimated at 77,754,000. The coin, including bullion, in the Treasury aggregates \$1,734,861,774, which sum, with \$748,285,518 of United States notes and bank notes, makes a grand total of \$2,483,147,292.

Mr. and Mrs. Zacheus Gaskill, Dresbach, Minn., have ten children and five of them possess twelve fingers and as many toes. It is equally curious that every alternate child in point of age has an extra finger, those who are not blessed in that direction having six toes and only the normal number of fingers.

**FROM THE TELEGRAPH.**

The steamer Milwaukee cleared from New Orleans for Cape Town yesterday with 1,100 horses.

The American Federation of Catholic Societies, in session at Cincinnati, elected officers and adjourned.

The Fifth Avenue Hotel at Ford City, Pa., was burned. One man was killed and several badly injured.

William Allen was hanged at Uniontown, Pa., for killing Hiram McMillan, who was defending his wife's honor.

The steamship Rapidan cleared from Newport News for Liverpool with a cargo of 63,546 barrels of flour.

The grand jury of Norfolk returned indictments against 13 officials who participated in the November election.

The Norfolk and Western Railway company has placed an order with the Roanoke Machine Works for 1,250 freight cars.

At Galveston, Tex., yesterday, Alphonse Levy, United States customs inspector, was killed by being run over by a railroad train.

The Bank of Sturgiss, Ky., was robbed last night of between \$3,500 and \$4,000 by robbers who blew open the safe with nitroglycerine.

The latest information from the abducted missionary, Miss Stone, is that her condition has been made more comfortable. The brigands refuse to reduce the ransom demanded.

The little town of Graham, Va., was visited by a disastrous fire early yesterday morning, which caused the loss of one life and a property loss of from \$25,000 to \$30,000.

The largest duck farm in Virginia is that of Mr. H. Hansbrough near Winchester, whence 50,000 pounds of ducks have been shipped so far this year.

At Lima, S. C., yesterday, Edward Hellis, a young hat drummer, shot and killed his wife and his sister-in-law. He fired at his mother-in-law and at his son and used the last bullet on himself. He is expected to die.

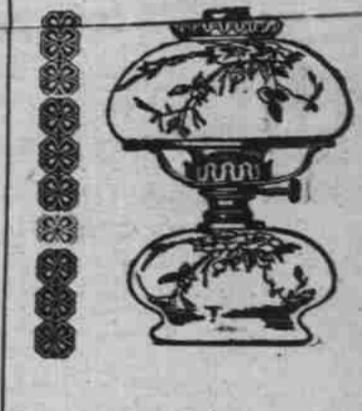
