Spencer, April 21. - The Spencer

JAPAN'S POINT.

MAY SUE FOR PEACE.

Unconfirmed Reports of Great Battle
Received Today.

London, April 22 - Reports
from several sources but not offi-
cially confirmed indicate that im-
portant events have transpired at
Port Arthur. It is believed that
the harbor has been blocked and
Port Arthur is now doomed. It
is stated that provisions and am-
munition are scarce there and no
new supply can reach the town
which has been cut off by sea and
land.

Paris, April 22 - Reports from
Corea are conflicting. The report
of fighting on the Yalu is not
credited here as semi-official re-
ports from Manchuria state that
everything is quiet on the river.

Shanghai, April 22 - The deser-
tion of five companies of picked
Corean soldiers completely armed,
which were recently sent to north
east provinces, has had a demoral-
izing influence on the population,
which is already restless and ex-
cited over high taxes. A revolu-
tionary party is said to be inciting
the people against the Japanese
and the situation is practically
becoming critical.

London, April 22 - It is report-
ed here from a reliable source that
Japan does not intend pushing the
war to a bitter end. She does not
want to humble Russia and the
sole intention of Japan is to de-
stroy the Russian fleet and Russia's
two strong holds on the Pacific,
Port Arthur and Vladivostok.

It is also reported that the
position in Corea is impregnable.
That is accomplished it will make
offers of peace. Not until then
will it accept anything but uncondi-
tional acceptance of the former
terms.

Paris, April 22 - It is reported
from Port Arthur that the mutil-
ated body of Admiral Molas, who
went down with the Petropavlovsk
was washed ashore today.

Paris, April 22 - It is reported
that Russia is negotiating with
Greece and Argentina for the
purchase of warships.

Archangel, April 22 - Two Jap-
anese, believed to be spies, have
been arrested near Votogda with
plans in their possession.

Tien Tsin, April 22 - The Im-
perial Chinese Railway announced
this morning that it will not re-
ceive code messages at Yinkow af-
ter this. The war correspondents
at Makden and New Chwang will
not be able to send anything of
importance owing to this decision.
The immediate cause is said to be
the report of Viceroy Alexiff in
which he declared that Yinkow is
included in the district under mar-
tial law.

Announcing Themselves.

bodies have been recovered by the
rescuing parties.

temporarily unbalanced.

BIG COMPANY DOMESTICATES.

Operates Gold Mines in Stanly and
Cabarrus.

Raleigh, April 21. - The State
charters the Otagusta Manufac-
turing Company at Waynesville, to
produce lumber and wood products.
The Carolina Mining and Min-
ing Company, chartered in Dela-
ware, domesticates itself in this
State. Its headquarters are in Cleve-
land, Ohio, and its mines are in
Stanly and Cabarrus counties. Its
capital stock is \$200,000.

A SHELL PROOF BOAT.

A Remarkable Story About the Cruis-
er Bayan.

Port Arthur, Wednesday, April
21. - The situation here is un-
changed. A large launch from
Petropavlovsk was brought into
harbor today. Two other naval
officers have arrived and will be
attached to the Russian headquar-
ters.

The cruiser Bayan suffered no
damage from the shells poured in
on her from the Japanese ships
when the Bayan went to the as-
sistance of the Russian destroyers,
April 13th, just previous to the
sinking of the Petropavlovsk.
Bayan in driving away the Japane-
se destroyers which sunk the
Strashni was subjected to the fire
of six Japanese cruisers.

CORTELYOU'S ORDER.

be begun before July 1st of each
year. The order signed today
allows fishing as soon as salmon
begin to run on the Alaskan coast.
