Articles incorporating the Carolina Copper Company, have been received here, says the Salisbury correspondent of the Rateigh Post. "This company is chartered under the laws of New Jersey, and will commence operations soon, at the old Carrolton mine some 6 miles from Salisbury. The deposits of copper at this mine are very rich and seem to be practi-

cally inexhaustable. "A concentration plant will be erected immediately and the mine will be worked on a business basis and in the hopes of developing the copper mining business in this section. A carload of ore shipped from this mine recently brought eighteen dollars per ton in copper two dollars and seventy-five cents per ton in gold and one dollar and seventeen cents per ton in silver. The mine will be operated on an estimated output of fifty tons per
