FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY.

OF REV. DR. J. RUMPLE'S PASTORATE.

The Historical Sermon Will be Preached This Morning by Dr. Rumble. Dr. Davis Will Preach To-night. This morning at 11 o'clock the anniversary exercises of the fortieth year's services of Rev. Dr. J. THE ELECTRIC LINE.

Salisbury will Probably get an Electric Car Line.

Unless all signs fail Salisbury will get an electric car line next Spring. It will be remembered that application was made to the legislature at its extra session last summer to grant the charter to a company that was fully prepared to put in the line at once. The failure of the general assembly to act on any private measures at that time, however, prevented the project's materialization and since then nothing has been done. We learn that parties who had the matter in hand then, however, have not given it up and will make application to the general assembly in January for a charter. If it is built the line will form a connecting link between Salisbury and Spencer.

U. D. C. Convention.

Mrs. W. H. Overman and Mrs. W. S. Negus returned last night from Montgomery, Alabama, where they have been attending the annual meeting of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. SYNOD HAS ADJOURNED.

A PLEASANT SESSION THIS YEAR.

35,000 Communicant Members of the Presbyterian Church in North Carolina, 375 Churches, and 157 Ministers. At 12:30 o'clock Saturday the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina adjourned, after one of the most successful sessions it has ever held. The attendance was larger than for a number of years past, and the members were delighted with their entertainment in the capital city.

Yesterday resolutions were adopted thanking the people of the city, and especially the congregation of the Presbyterian church, for their open-hearted hospitality; to Peace Institute and the State Institution for the Blind for entertainments tendered; to the press of the city for their courtesies, and to the several railroads for reduced rates. The morning session was devoted to the completion of considerable routine work that more important matters had crowded out. A good many matters of minor importance were disposed of. The records of the Synod show that there are 375 Presbyterian churches in the State, with 157 ministers actively at work, and nearly 85,000 communicants. The church is in a healthy and growing condition. Its record in contributions probably exceeds that of any other denomination in the State, with only 85,000 members, it contributed to foreign missions \$21,000, and to home missions in various departments \$81,000. The success of the meeting this week is due largely to the efforts of Dr. Eugene Daniel, the pastor of the Raleigh church, and his congregation. The delegates, except the ministers who are to fill local pulpits today, returned to their homes yesterday.

NOTT HAS BEEN CAPTURED.

THE NEGRO CAUGHT AT MONROE.

Sheriff McCain Receives a Telegram That Nott was Caught at Monroe To-day and Goes After Him. Special to TRUTH-INDEX. Albemarle, N. C., Nov. 17.—A telegram to Sheriff McCain, of Stanly county, received here this morning, stated that John Nott, who was liberated by a mob from the Albemarle jail Wednesday night, had been captured. Sheriff McCain immediately left for Monroe to identify his prisoner and take possession of him. If the man taken is Nott he will not be brought back to Albemarle but will probably be taken to Charlotte for safe keeping.

There are still a variety of opinions expressed as to the motive of the mob in storming the jail and the theory that Nott was deliberately liberated through fear that he might give testimony damaging to others is strongly supported.
