THE HEALTH OF SOUTHERN TOWNS.

We clip the following from the Vincennes Globe, a paper well read and of Republican principles:

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STATE ITEMS.

Winston is to have a park and electric lights.

The telegraph has been completed to Lenoir.

Winston is talking of starting a building and loan association.

Two hundred and ten guests are at the Battery Park Hotel in Asheville.

A fire at Oxford this week destroyed 21 houses, loss \$150,000; insurance about half.

William Crowell, a young physician of Lenoir county, died suddenly in his buggy on Tuesday.

The Statesville Building and Loan Association has concluded to loan money to Salisbury.

The coal market in Mecklenburg has been cleared up for the first time in three years.

Forest fire near Forest City, in Rutherford county, are destroying thousands of pounds of fence.

The Charlotte Plow and Machine Company have bought out a Greensboro machine shop and are moving the machinery to Charlotte.

Five additional cottages have been completed at Blowing Rock, by the Hotel Company, and Mr. Morris has finished three and is building three more. A large boarding house is being built by Messrs. Kirby and Gray, on this side of Mr. Morris's.

It is reported that the C. C. & C. R. R. is to be opened for business from Blacks to Rutherfordton, a distance of 25 miles, on April 1st, and that a contract has been let to complete the road from Blacks to Camden, and from Camden to Charlotte via Lancaster.

We learn from the Charlotte Chronicle that the prosperous and enterprising little town of Lumberton, on the Carolina Central road, was visited by a very extensive and destructive fire last Sunday morning, two blocks of buildings, comprising the business portion of the town, having been laid in ashes. The total loss by the fire was one hundred thousand dollars, and upon this there was an insurance of only \$30,000. The fire was discovered at three o'clock Sunday morning, and is believed to have originated in a barber shop on Main street, opposite the National hotel. The fire swept both sides of Main street from that point to the river and to the railroad. A letter received in Charlotte from Mr. A. A. Nathan, proprietor of the National hotel, says: "We did not save anything, and barely escaped with our lives. When we were awakened, the window glass was falling in the flames." Mr. Nathan Sobler, a former resident of Salisbury, but who has been located in Lumberton for some time past, was a sufferer by
