NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The Nile is very high and still rising. John Dell, of Tiffin, Ohio, dies of lockjaw. A paper mill at Elkhart, Ind., destroyed by fire.

A \$300,000 fire in Detroit, Mich., destroys a cooorage. Sixteen horses burned to death at Hunter's Point, L. I.

Prince Ferdinand, of Bulgaria, has formed a new ministry. Judge Moore was assassinated from ambush in Cross county, Ark.

Russia is about to build a railroad from the Caspian to the Pacific. It is proposed to settle the fishery disputes with Canada by a new treaty.

The Pennsylvania Democratic State Convention heartily indorses Cleveland. At the suggestion of Russia, Turkey has consented to appoint a governor of Bulgaria.

A convict trying to escape from the New Brunswick, N. J., prison is riddled by bullets. The Baltimore & Ohio deal has at last been finally settled and everybody feels relieved.

The colored people of South Carolina commemorate the earthquake by religious services. Ed. Cooley, of Lancaster, Ky., when shot at by the Green brothers, killed them both with a shotgun.

It is said that Prince Ferdinand, of Bulgaria, is going on a European tour—not to return. William Lively appointed State Treasurer of Pennsylvania, vice M. S. Quay, who was lately elected U. S. Senator.

The steam yacht, Mohican, just arrived from Scotland, lands the crew of the wrecked ship, Lillian, seventeen in all. A steamer sailed from Galveston for Liverpool Thursday, with 4,000 bales of new cotton.

The steamer Knickerbocker arrived at the mouth of the Mississippi. She was several days overdue, and had caused great uneasiness. One miner killed, one fatally, and four others badly wounded by the explosion of a quantity of dynamite at a mine near Shenandoah, Pa.

A burglar in New York, in trying to escape, tried to jump through a plate glass window, but was impaled on the broken glass and died in a few minutes. The Exeter Theatre in London was found to be on fire on Monday evening. One hundred and fifty persons were roasted, trampled, or suffocated to death.

It is rumored that M. T. Polk who robbed the State treasury of several hundred thousands of dollars in Tennessee, and was sent to the penitentiary where he died, is still alive and in Mexico. The British Parliament decides against the project of tunnelling the Channel. Fear actuates these noble sons of Albion in opposing a scheme of incalculable commercial importance and great convenience.

A youthful clerk in a Savings Bank in Maine, being left alone in the bank, departed with cash and negotiable bonds to the amount of \$279,000. He left the gold, it is supposed, because it was too heavy for him.

The Wilkesboro Chronicle publishes a letter from David Risley, Esq., to Col. C. J. Cowles, dated New York, August 23, in which he says that the South Atlantic and Northwestern Railroad is not, as has been supposed, a dead cock in the pit; but on the contrary he has placed the bonds for the whole line, some \$7,000,000, and work will begin at Smithville on or before October 1st and trains will be running through to Cincinnati in less than three years. The public, he says, will soon hear of his being at work with a strong force.

Inspecting the Convict System. Says the Charlotte Chronicle: "Mr. Thomas J. Sumner, chairman of the board of county commissioners of Rowan county, arrived at the Central yesterday morning, and spent the day in inspecting the county convict system. Under escort of Col. D. G. Maxwell he visited the convict camp, and also inspected all the roads that had been macadamized by convict labor. The system of working the roads by convicts has been inaugurated in Rowan, and the object of Col. Sumner's visit was to examine into the workings of the system in Mecklenburg."

Meeting of County Commissioners, Monday, Sept. 5, '87.

All present. J. F. Robinson instructed to examine the race across the public road leading from China Grove to Organ Church, at Dr. Phillip's mill, to repair bridge or make the crossing passable in some way.

\$15.00 appropriated for a new bridge across Sechler's spring branch on the new cut road in Atwell township; provided the neighboring citizens contribute the balance as they promised.

Ordered that J. F. Robinson work the convicts on the public roads from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m., allowing one hour for dinner; Saturday to work only till 4 o'clock, p. m., and be allowed \$1.50 per day and \$1.00 for all necessary guards.

Ordered that the Sheriff issue license to J. W. Hammill to retail spirituous liquors, wines, etc., by a measure not to exceed one quart, under the usual conditions and upon payment of the necessary funds.

A petition for a new polling place in Providence was laid on the table. A petition for a public road leading from A. G. Hobler's, near Amity Hill, at the Iredell county line, to intersect with the Stateville and Salisbury road was granted conditionally.

Ordered that J. F. Robinson build a bridge across the south fork of Crane creek, on Stokes ferry road at the Groupy place. Resolved that the road leading from a point on the Lincolnton road just outside the Salisbury town line at the forks of the road near Simon Jefferson's blacksmith shop, to a point on the Charlotte road about 1 1/2 mile from town, and running between the lands of S R Harrison and Alfred Johnston, be and the same is hereby declared a public road.

Ordered that all the necessary water works apparatus be put in the jail at once. Adam M Brown, keeper of the poor, reported an average of 17 paupers during August—8 whites, 9 negroes, expenses of keeping them, \$34.70.

Several allowances made for outdoor paupers. After approving several county claims the board adjourned.

OUR STATE.

Five bales of new cotton were sold in Charlotte Monday. Durham shipped 45,107 pounds of smoking tobacco and over 12,000,000 cigarettes.

Twenty-four thousand dollars worth of building now under contract in Charlotte, says the Chronicle. Miss Mollie, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. R. Anderson, of Albemarle, died on Thursday, the 1st inst.

Mr. Morris has withdrawn from the Winston tobacco firm of Payne, Lunn and Morris. Messrs. Payne & Lunn will continue the plug business.

St. Phillips Episcopal church, in this place, is being torn down preparatory for the erection of a new one upon the same site.—Davie Times.

SECTION 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to buy, sell, deliver or receive for a price, or for any reward whatever, any cotton in the seed where the quantity is less than what is usually baled, except as herein after provided.

SEC. 2. The person so buying or receiving seed cotton as aforesaid shall enter upon a book to be kept by him or her for such purpose the date of such buying or receiving, the number of pounds in each lot, the person or persons from whom bought or received, and the price paid for same per pound, and shall keep said book open to inspection by the public at all business hours of the day.

SEC. 3. Any person buying or receiving seed cotton, who shall fail to keep the book as aforesaid, or shall fail or neglect to make therein the entries aforesaid at the time of such buying or receiving, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars or imprisoned not exceeding thirty days.

SEC. 4. In all prosecutions under this act it shall only be necessary for the state to allege and prove that the defendant bought or received the seed cotton as charged, and the burden shall be upon the defendant to show that the provisions of this act have been complied with.

SEC. 5. This act shall be in force and effect from and after its ratification. In the general assembly read three times, and ratified this the 4th day of March, A. D. 1887.
