OMAHA, NEB., Nov. 14.—The anarchists of this city met in a saloon on North street yesterday and carried on for half an hour over the fate of their Chicago brothers, and before dispersing nailed an anarchist's flag draped in mourning to a pole and hung it on the outside.

A Mammoth Cave Discovered.

GALENA, ILL., Nov. 16.—The discovery of a mammoth cave in the town of Shullsburg, Wisconsin, containing thousands of tons of black jack or zinc ore, has caused no little excitement among miners.

Anarchists Meeting in Birmingham.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., Nov. 14.—About thirty anarchists held a meeting last night in the room of a German saloon keeper. The hanging of their friends in Chicago was discussed and characterized as judicial murder, and the sentiment of the meeting was for revenge.

MINING NOTES.

Asha County. The ore sent us is manganese. The rock a porphyritic formation. Your region is porphyry.

A party of miners from Arizona have purchased a mineral property (free gold) in the southwestern part of Davidson county—an undeveloped saccharoidal quartz vein.

The Phoenix mine is working right along on their \$20 ore, and for the last three or four years their output has been steadily increasing up to this date.

At the Reed mine they are forking the water from an old shaft and sluicing the surface. One of the deep shafts has developed the underlayer that will prove how essential it is in all mining ground to ascertain the dip and strike of overflows, or local disturbances of strata.

The samples of galena ores sent us by J. H. are of complex gangue, the sulphide of iron occurring on or near the hanging wall as you so express it must be kept separate from the galena ore by dressing. The slate parting will run out in depth and the vein matter become more compact. Will assay.

A deposit of chromic iron has been lately opened in Jackson county, N. C., that exposes a bed nearly four feet in width running irregular near the surface. The ore yields 45 per cent. chromic oxide. Near this outcrop is a nickel garnette or genette. Experts have been sent to the locality to make a thorough examination.

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Refused to Make Him Pastor.

SAVANNAH, GA., Nov. 14.—The independent Presbyterian church of this city refused yesterday by a vote of 189 to 119 to make Rev. Leonard Woolsey Bacon its permanent pastor. Dr. Bacon came here from Conn., a year ago, on trial. His ability and eloquence have won him many friends, but some utterances which seemed to reflect upon Southern ideas as compared with those of the North, led to ill feeling on the part of many.
