Publishing the Laws.

Recently, a colored messenger, from the office of Secretary of State in Raleigh, arrived in this place, with the laws enacted in 1867 8, for distribution, and employed a party to distribute them in the adjacent counties to the Superior Court Clerks .-Why this delay, we do not know, but suppose that they could not be earlier published, and why not? Because, we suppose, all the public printing is given to one office in Raleigh, which has more than it can do in due time. We are informed that the county officials, have little or no use for these laws, at this late day, and to distribute them incurs a useless expense, to say nothing of the cost of printing them. But the county officials do stand in great need of the laws enacted by the last Legislature, which are not yet made public, except knowing how to proceed.
