The Housekeeper's Receipts.

FROZEN BUTTER. Make a custard—One quart of milk, three eggs; let it simmer, but not boil. When cool add the sugar and freeze.

Persons having floors to sweep, such as public halls, stores, &c., will find that by taking pine sawdust, wetting it thoroughly, and after pouring off all the water it absorbed, sprinkling the floor slightly with it, they may not only sweep very clean, but make scarcely any dust. Try it.

Best will together one cupful of white or rice bran sugar, one table-spoonful of corn starch, and a little salt; then add one pint of boiling water and let it boil after taking from the stove, add butter and nutmeg to suit the taste.

Take one quart of the best elder vinegar (if possible); add to it two quarts of ripe raspberries; let it stand twenty-four hours; mash the berries and strain, adding two quarts more fruit after straining; let it stand one day; wash and strain, putting two quarts of fresh fruit; when these have stood twenty-four hours strain; put one pound of sugar to one pint of juice; boil fifteen minutes, removing the scum.

One pint of sifted flour, one coffee-cupful of sugar, the same of milk, two ounces of butter, one egg, grated rind of a lemon, two teaspoonfuls of cream tartar rubbed into the flour. Cream the butter and sugar, add the milk, yolk of eggs beaten; alternate the flour and white of eggs; beat stiffly; and last of all one teaspoonful of soda dissolved in milk. Bake in a well buttered round pan in a quick oven.

No acids should be employed to clean tinware, because they attack the metal and remove it from the iron in which it forms a thin coat. We refer to articles made of tin-plate, which consists of iron covered with tin.
