Each unit contains an area thirty miles square. Now each unit is a center from which the zones are drawn and so every unit in the country no matter where it is situated will have zones drawn from it just exactly as Washington has them drawn from For instance, take Keckuk, Ia., which is in a unit in the fifth zone. From that will be drawn circles exactly as they are drawn from Washington and they will be numbered from Keokuk as number one, just as they are numbered from Washington as number one. The rates therefore are fixed from the unit in which the postoffice is located, but they are the same from that office to any point in any

one zone. It will be seen by reference to the table of rates of postage that it will cost more per pound to send a package a long distance than it does to send it a short distance. The rate increases for a package weighing one pound at the rate of one cent for each zone. No package weighing more than 11 pourds can be sent under the new parcel post law. Of course, more weight can be sent if it is sent in different parcels, but the cost in that case would be heavier, because the increase per pound on a single package is not great up to 11 pounds, and probably it would increase at no greater rate if the government were to raise the limit of weight which is now

Every postmaster in the United States will have a parcel post map like the one which is here reproduced except that the zone lines will be shown with the unit of his postoffice as a center. All that a postmaster will have to do when a percel is presented for transportation is to find out in what zone the destination of the package dies. His table will show him instantly the rate per pound from the unit in which his postoffice lies to the zone of the package's destination, the price, as has been explained before, to every postoffice in any one zone being the same. The parcel post will take nothing but fourth-class matter. Printed matter is still in the third-class designation. Therefore books cannot be sent by the parcel post system.

> The minimum rate will be five cents, for the first pound and three cents for each additional pound to any point not exceeding fifty miles from the office of mailing; the local rate, which is five cents for the first pound and one cent for additional pound, applies to all parcels the delivery of which does not involve their transportation on railway lines. The rates increase for each successive one of the eight zones. the maximum rate being twelve cents a pound, which will carry a parcel across the continent or to any of our possessions. Parcels will be limited to eleven pounds in weight and six feet in length and girth combined.

Mailable Perishable Articles.

Butter, lard and perishable articles such as fish, fresh meats, dressed fowls, vegetables, fruits, berries and articles of a similar nature that decay quickly, when so packed or wrapped as to prevent damage to other mail matter, will be accepted for local delivery either at the office of mailing or on any rural route starting therefrom When inclosed in an inner cover and a strong outer cover of wood, metal, heavy torrugated pasteboard or other sultable material and wrapped so that nothing can escape from the package, they will be accepted for mailing to any offices within the first zone or within a radius of 50 miles. It should be said that the act of Butter, lard, or any greasy or oily subcongress which puts a parcel post stance intended for delivery at offices plan into operation does not in any beyond the first zone must be suitably packed. Confectionery and Soap.

Candles, confectionery, yeast cakes, soap in hard cakes, etc., must be inclosed in boxes and so wrapped as to prevent injury to other mail mat-

Scaled original packages of proprietary articles, such as soaps, tobacco, pills, tablets, etc., put up in fixed quantities by the manufacturer, and not in themselves unmailable, will be accepted for mailing when properly wrapped.

Millinery.

Fragile articles, such as millinery. toys, musical instruments, etc., and articles consisting wholly or in part of glass, or contained in glass, must be securely packed and the parcel stamped or labeled "FRAGILE"

Unmailable Matter.

The following matter is declared un-

mailable by law: Matter manifestly obscene, lews, or laselvious; articles intended for preventing conception; articles intended for indecent or immoral purposes; all matters otherwise mailable by law, the outside cover or wrapper of which bears any delineation or language of a libelous, scurrilous, defamatory, or threatening character. Intoxicants, Polsons and Inflammable Materials.

Spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquors of any kind; poisons of every kind, and articles and compositions containing poli sons, poisonous animals, insects and reptiles; explosives of every kind; ininflammable material (which are held to include matches, kerosene oil, gasoline, naphtha, benzine, turgentine, denatured alcohol, etc.), infernal machines, and mechanical, chemical other devices or compositions which may ignite or explode; disease germs or scabs, and other natural or artiffcial articles, compositions or materials of whatever kind which may kill, or in any wise injure another or damage the mail or others property.

Postmasters will refuse to for mailing parcels not properly dorsed or packed for safe shipment.

Pistols, Animals and Birds.

Pistols or revolvers, whether in dotached parts or otherwise; live or dead (and not stuffed) animals, birds, or poultry, except as elsewhere provilled; raw hides or pelts, guano, or any article having a bad odor will not be admitted to the mails.

Insurance on Parcels. A mallable parcel on which the postage is fully prepaid may be insured against loss in an amount equivalent to its actual value, but not to exceed \$50, on payment of a fee of ten cents in parcel post stamps, such stamps to be affixed.

Parcels may be remailed or forwarded on the payment of additional postage at the rate which would be chargeable if they were originally mailed at the forwarding office, in which case the necessary stamps will be affixed by the forwarding postmanter. Payment must be made every time the parcel is forwarded,

Maps and Guides. Parcel post maps, with accompany ing guldes, are to be sold to the pub lic at their cost, 75 cents, through chief clerk of the post office depart-ment. In ordering maps care should be taken to specify the post offic from which the postage rates are to

FACTS ABOUT THE NEW PARCEL POST

The new parcel post goes into operation January 1, 1913. Only mail matter now included in fourth class, or merchandiso, will

Perishable articles such as butter, lard, fruits, berries and dres fowls may be sent short distances.

Eggs for local delivery when packed in containers may be sent packed separately they may be sent any distance.

Fresh meats may be sent only in the first zone (50 miles).

There are no restrictions on saited, dried or cured meats or fis Millinery, toys, musical instruments, glassware and breakable must be marked "fragile."

The following may not be sent: intoxicating liquors, po matches, explosives, firearms and live poultry.

Books and printed matter are included in third class and materials.

The weight limit will be eleven pounds.

RATES OF POSTAGE

Parcela weighing four ounces or less are mailable at the rate of one cent for each ounce or fraction of an ounce, regardless of distance. Parcels weighing more than four ounces are maliable at the pound rate, as shown by the following table, and when mailed at this rate any fraction of a pound is considered a full pound.
