The world has about 15,000,000 telephones and of this number the United States has approximately \$,540,000, Europe 4,020,000 and other countries 1,300,000. According to the latest world telephone census, the total telephone investment is \$1,906,000,000 and of this amount \$1,005,000,000 was credited to the United States, \$526,000,000 in Europe and \$175,000,000 in other countries. The annual telephone conversations total 24,600,000,000 divided as follows: United States 15,000,000,000; Europe 5,800,000,000, and other countries 2,200,000,000. The total world wire telephons mileage is 33,262,000 miles divided as follows: United States 20,262,000, Europe 10,335,000, and other countries 2,579,000.
