The Southside Railroad—The High Bridge. The Petersburg Index of Thursday says: Gen. Mahone, accompanied by a corps of competent engineers, arrived at Farmville, yesterday, and will at once commence the survey of a route in this direction, as authorized by the stockholders of the company, for the laying of a track by which the High Bridge may be avoided. The completion of such a road—and we understand the work will be vigorously prosecuted—is very much to be desired.

Among other improvements on this road we may mention the near approach to completion of two fine iron bridges over the James river, after the pattern of the bridge on the Norfolk and Petersburg railroad just below Petersburg. New rails are also being rapidly laid along the track at such places as most-ly need them. It is certain that whilst no serious accident ever happened at the High Bridge, and whilst it may be as safe as any other part of the road, the Southside road could never become popular so long as that bridge disfigured it.
