A Mystery. On Wednesday last while taking up the flooring of Mr. John R. Johnson's shoe factory on the corner of Main and Franklin streets, the workmen engaged therein were horrified at discovering on the ground beneath the flooring, the skeletons of five human beings.

Here, veiled in mystery, which the last great day alone will solve, is perhaps one of the darkest, most cold-blooded crimes which ever shocked a civilized people.

The building, which is a portion of the old Court House of Bute county, was removed to this place on the formation of Warren and has been occupied since 1844 by its present owner Mr. Johnson, whose character for integrity and high principle, entirely divests him of any tinge of suspicion, particularly as the appearance of the partially decayed bones of the skeletons point to a period further back as the date of their deposit there.

Just ninety years ago, Bute county was divided into Warren and Franklin, and the building used as a court house moved to the capital of the new county of Warren, where it has been variously used since as law offices, tene-ment rooms, Hotel, bar and gambling rooms, &c. It does not require a very great effort to fancy, amid the demoralization immediately succeeding the revolution, the establishment for, far away from the busy centres of trade and travel, of a den of murderers and thieves, whose bloody record perished with their numerous victims, and whose existence is marked only now by the grinning jaws of the five silent witnesses so recently brought to light.

This is the only reasonable solution of the problem, as the oldest of our citizens remember nothing in the least degree calculated to throw light on the subject.

We think our good friend Mr. Johnson would find it profitable to tear down the premises and make a thorough search for buried treasure, which doubtless plentifully abounds in the shape of sundry earthen jars full of Spanish doubloons or British sovereigns.

The reputation for good schools, enjoyed and sustained by our village in the past bids fair to be revived, at least as to an extent, as the depleted finances of the people at large justifies. Prior to the war, no village in the state boasted better or larger schools, both male and female, than Warrenton, none possessed greater advantages in location, healthfulness, or suitable buildings for the purpose. Certainly, none claimed greater talent and ability in its principals and teachers. With the war, the ability of the people to sustain these institutions vanished. Teachers were scattered, and the schools languished.

With the location of Rev. Turner Jones we now claim for Warrenton one of the best institutions of learning in the State. The three female schools being in charge of Mr. Jones, Mrs. V. L. Jones and Mrs. S. D. Twitty, and Mrs. Wilcox, at either of which the young lady is sure of finding parental care and attention, firmness in enforcing strict attention to her studies and a conscientious watchfulness over her morals and health, with every facility for finishing her course of study, a finished lady, abundantly fitted for the duties pertaining to her sphere of life. The male Academy under the direction of Capt. John Dugger A. M. is every way worthy of the patronage of a discriminating public, who can but discover in him every element composing the finished scholar and gentleman.

Sambo Versus John Chinaman—The California Republicans. The homely old adage that "Chickens come home to roost," when applied to those who meet with punishment or embarrassment as the consequence of their own acts, is verified in the case of the nigger-worshipping radicals of California. They have gone with their party for negro suffrage, for elevating the Southern negroes over the white people and for the constitutional amendment putting all colors and races of men on an equality, and now they are alarmed at the consequences of their ultra-radicalism.

They are likely to have as large a dose of the Chinese as they have forced the Southern whites to swallow of the negro. They are sick at stomach in advance and in contemplation of the future. The Republican State Convention of California in its platform of resolutions emphatically "opposes Chinese suffrage in any form." Like the radicals of other States of the North they magnanimously give the suffrage to the ignorant and brutal negro—to the lowest race of mankind—because they have feared any negroes among them; but it is quite another thing when the Chinese are in question. How illogical and inconsistent are these republicans! Every one acquainted with history, as well as every physiologist, knows that the Chinese are a far superior and more intellectual race than the negroes, they were civilized people when the nations of Europe were barbarians, and in many things they may yet learn from them. In some arts they are yet superior; in agriculture they have attained a high point of excellence, and in the social or domestic virtues they will compare with the most civilized people, and they maintained an organized government and system of society from the earliest times to the present day, while the negroes have never emerged from barbarism, except with some degree of civilization has been forced upon them by the white man. We tell these California republicans they must be logical in this matter. They cannot escape from the consequences of their own acts and the acts of their party. If the suffrage is not to be held exclusively by the white race of European stock, and if the negroes are to be put on an equality with our own intellectual race the Chinese cannot be excluded. If we are to try the experiment of a mongrel republican empire that race which stands next to the Caucasian cannot be placed beneath the negro, the lowest of all. Many of our radicals may yet live to be seriously troubled by the political and social monster they have raised.—N. Y. Herald.
