To the honest minded man who loves his country and desires her welfare and permanence among the nations of the earth, the wide-spread dishonesty among officials is well calculated to arouse wholesome fears. Never before in the history of the country was dishonesty so rife in all departments, or so all pervading in its working.

It is no wonder that with extended systems like these the national debt instead of growing smaller, in proportion to the high rate of taxation, continues to increase. It is no wonder that gold keeps up, and that all propositions for a return to specie payments are looked upon as impracticable.

We wish to inform our citizens ofprising townsman, Mr. E. Shroyer, has made preparations with which to supply those who are fond of such delicious luxuries, during the winter season, with cans for putting up their own fresh peaches, tomatoes and other delicacies such as they desire.

and represents that the claims for quartermaster's stores are all fraudulent; that they were made up upon false papers by his partner without his (Blackburn's) knowledge. In addition, he affirms that a certain lieutenant, then connected with the quartermaster's department in East Tennessee, now in the regular army, acting in the Freedmen's Bureau, was a close friend of Hanford, that from their conversation about the time these claims were made up he inferred they kept well supplied with proofs, forged in blank.

It says he has found several blank certificates of loyalty, already signed, and blank certificates of citizenship, bearing the signature of citizens of the County Court, and the seal of the court in Hanford's desk. The mention of the name of the lieutenant above alluded to reminded the officers at the Treasury that he too had been a claim agent, and the record was examined. From that source and from private inquiry it has been discovered that he drew several thousand dollars upon a batch of claims; that there are no "brief marks" upon any of the papers showing the red tape evidence of their having passed through the tedious departmental routine; that no clerk or other person has any recollection or remembrance of their having passed through his hands, consequently they must have been sprung at the first start, upon the settlement bureau.

In addition to this it is certain that in less than two weeks after he presented the claims they were paid, when the usual period required to accomplish such business is from one to four years; and, worse than all, it is discovered that the papers themselves, the Treasury warrant and the indorsement upon which the warrant was paid, are all downright forgeries. The Treasury detectives are working the cases up. How far the rascalities will extend it is impossible now to say, but it is hinted that several gentlemen holding, or who have held positions under government, are in danger of having their shirt collars ruffled by the indicate hands of persons holding commissions as special agents of the Treasury Department.
