THE GOVERNOR DEAD.

(Special to GAZETTE.) RALEIGH, N. C., 4-8-91. Gov. Fowle died suddenly last night at 11 o'clock.

Coke Succeeds Saunders.

Capt. Octavius Coke is Secretary of State.

Since the death of the lamented Gov. Saunders the question of his successor has bothered the minds of many.

Numerous and prominent names were mentioned in connection with it and enthusiastically discussed.

Among them were such men as Ex Gov. Thos. J. Jarvis, Capt. Octavius Octavius Coke, Ex Judge T. B. Womack, W. P. Batchelor, Esq., Joseph P. Caldwell, Esq., R. M. Farman, Esq., Gen. W. P. Roberts, Dr. Jno. S. Long and Col. F. E. Shober.

At ten o'clock yesterday morning Gov. Fowle sent a communication to Capt. Coke informing him of his appointment to be Secretary of State of North Carolina.

The news went over the city with almost a flash. He at once accepted and took the oath of office prescribed by the Constitution in the presence of a number of distinguished gentlemen.

After his giving his bond the first appointment was that of Mr. Plummer Batchelor to continue in the office he has so long and faithfully held as Chief Clerk.

NEWS JOTTINGS.

General Miles is going on a trip to Mexico. Railroad passengers in Colorado snow bound.

Violent storms and heavy floods prevail throughout Spain. Breaks in the Mississippi levees threaten to flood several counties in the State.

Sylva d'Ornon started from Paris last week to walk to Moscow on stilts.

Owing to the failure of the shore fisheries there is much suffering in Newfoundland.

Ninety thousand pounds of opium, valued at \$1,800,000 has been imported in this country in four months.

The Monte Carlo lost \$100,000 yesterday, the highest amount lost in one day in twenty years.

Arrangements have been perfected through the County Commissioners to supply needy South Dakota farmers with seed grains.

An epidemic of pneumonia is raging among the members of the South Dakota Legislature at Sioux Falls. Two have died, one is on his deathbed, and twenty-five are seriously ill.

The Executive Committee of the World's Fair Directory has appropriated \$150,000 for cash premiums. Influenza is prevalent in Berlin.

Canada had a violent shock of earthquake recently. Senator Harlan has nearly recovered from the grip.

Thomas Farrington, the London banker, died at Rome.

The crop prospects of Kansas, Nebraska and South Dakota are good.

General Boots, the head of the Salvation Army, is seriously ill in London.

General Gibbon, now in command in California, goes on the retired list of the army.

Dom Pedro, with his daughter Isabella and son visited Queen Victoria at Grasse.

The public debt increased nearly half a million in March and the customs receipts decreased.

Two negroes were lynched for arson at Russellville, Ala., last week.

The new farce comedy "A Lucky Man," brought out at Niblo's New York this week, is a great success.

Ten strikers were killed, and four wounded in a riot at Frick coke works, Morewood, Pa., last Thursday.

Yellow fever developed on the steamer Trent between Brazil and England, and is reported to be increasing at Rio Janeiro.

Postmaster General Wanaker is negotiating with the ministers from Chili and Venezuela for the execution of the post subsidy law.

There are serious threats of a clam or between Tottenville, S. I., and Keyport, N. J., over the dividing line between their fisheries.

The mother the Nicely brothers, who were hanged at Somerset, Pa., Thursday, has become a raving maniac.

German manufacturers met in Berlin yesterday and unanimously resolved to take part in the Chicago World's Fair.

The City Council of Glasgow have just purchased Wistler's celebrated portrait of Carlyle for 1,000 guineas.

The will of the late General Joseph E. Johnston was filed in Washington yesterday. The value of the estate is estimated at \$30,000.

Clay county, Missouri, will be represented of the World's Fair by a span of mules 18 hands high and which weigh 3800 pounds.
