IN COUNCIL.
The Tenth Annual Council of the Eastern Diocese of North Carolina.
A DELIGHTFUL SESSION.
SECOND DAY—MAY 29.

The Council re-assembled yesterday morning in the beautiful, vine-covered and classic looking church edifice, St. Peter's, at 10 o'clock, Bishop Watson in the Chair.

The Secretary, Rev. Nat. Harding, of this Parish, called the roll, and the following delegates who were absent on Wednesday responded to their names. They were—C. S. Dixon, Myers Bonner, Frank Vaughan, R. R. Cotten and Frank L. Mearns.

The minutes of the first days proceedings were read and approved.

The Bishop read the address. It was one of universal interest, showing a vast deal of earnest and efficient work done throughout the diocese. At the conclusion of this interesting and instructing address, the Council took a recess for the purpose of holding a memorial service to the late Rev. Dr. Hughes.

The service was a remarkably impressive one; all who were present felt profoundly the solemnity of the occasion.

Rev. Mr. George made a statement of facts embraced in the Ministerial life of the deceased. He was followed by the Rev. Dr. Carmichael, who paid a feeling and eloquent tribute to the departed one. He was followed by Rev. Dr. Huske, of Fayetteville, whose touching words moved all hearts. The Bishop then paid a tender and feeling tribute to the memory of the departed brother, with whom he had

abored so long in the Vineyard of the Lord.

Rev. Dr. Huske read report from the Committee on Canons.

Rev. R. B. Drane read report from Committee on Finance. The last year's scale of assessments was adopted.

Rev. Mr. Hoffman was excused from further attendance on account of sickness.

The Council here took a recess until 4 o'clock, afternoon.

In the interim the Conventions of Wilmington and Edenton held meetings and transacted business pertaining to their respective Conventions.

The Council assembled at 4 p. m., the Bishop in the chair.
Rev. Dr. Huske read the report of the Standing Committee.
The report of the Executive Missionary Committee was made the special order for half past ten today.
Dr. Carmichael made a verbal report as trustee of the Thompson Orphanage, which showed that Institution to be self-supporting and flourishing.

There are altogether 81 Parishes and Mission Stations.

The Council will probably adjourn today.

The Rt. Rev. Bishop will remain over and preach on Sunday. At night the Rite of Confirmation will be administered.

THIRD DAY.
Promptly at 10 o'clock the Council met with the Rt. Rev. Bishop in the chair. The minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

The chair appointed the following Committee on Canons: Rev. Dr. Huske, Rev. Dr. Carmichael, Rev. Thos. Atkinson, H. R. Bryan and Dr. DeRosset.

Dr. A. J. DeRosset offered a resolution relative to increasing the Episcopal fund.

Rev. Robt. Strange read the report of the Executive Missionary Committee.

On motion the Council went into the Committee of the Whole for the purpose of considering the report of the Executive Missionary Committee. The Hon. Dr. Shepherd, Chief Justice of the State, was elected chairman.

Rev. N. C. Hughes offered the following resolution:—Resolved, That immediately after the Bishop's address of the Second Day of the Annual Council, the Council resolve itself into a Board of Missions to consider and act on the subject of the Missionary Work of the Diocese.

This resolution developed considerable discussion, but no action was taken.

Mr. R. R. Cotten offered the following resolution:—Whereas, recognizing the growing necessity of extending our Missionary work, Resolved, That the Clergy, who have regular Parishes be requested to

devote one Sunday in each month to Missionary work, or as often as practicable, and their places made vacant by so doing be supplied by lay readers to be licensed by the Bishop. Discussion followed.

On motion the Committee rose, and the Chairman reported that no action was taken in regard to the first resolution and that the second was recommended favorably to the Council.

Mr. Cotten's resolution was passed by the Council. The resolution of Mr. Hughes was referred to the Committee on Canons.

Rev. Mr. Strange introduced a resolution relative to the arrangement of funds for Conventional purposes in Treasurer's report. Adopted.

Rev. Dr. Carmichael made a verbal report on the seal of the Diocese. The design is a very beautiful one. It was ordered that the seal be printed on the cover and title page of the Diocesan Journal, and that this be a standing rule.

The seal is lozenge shape, and on the border are the words "Seal of the Diocese of East Carolina." In the upper part of the seal is the mitre, underneath the date of organization of the Diocese of N. C.—1817. Below this, the first landing on Roanoke Island with date 1584; the baptism of the first white child, in America, Virginia Dare, and the date, 1577. Below these the motto of the Bishop of the Diocese "Christi crucis confido." At the bottom the cross supported by the key and the crook, and the date of organization of the Diocese of East Carolina, 1829.

The time decided upon for the next Council was reconsidered, and on motion of Rev. Mr. Strange, Thursday, May 24, '94 was chosen. The next Council will be held in St. Paul's church Edenton.

Mr. E. B. Roberts was excused from further attendance.
