ing.

The new Board of City Com-
missioners met at the City Hall
last evening for the purpose of
organization. The following offi-
cers were elected by the Board
for the ensuing year: Mayor,
W. M. Chauncey; Clerk, Jno. R.
Ross; Treasurer, A. Mayo; Chief
of Police, Jas. R. Grist; Assis-
tant Police, Jno. R. Wise;
Messrs. Shelton and Flynn, pol-
icemen and night watchmen.
Mr. D. M. Lewis was re-elected
superintendent of Oakdale Cem-
etery. Mr. Jas. O'Carroll was
re-elected city drayman. Mr.
J. S. Campbell was elected
keeper of the city clock. The
Board then adjourned, subject
to a call from the Mayor.

By phone we learn this morn-
ing of the death of Mr. W. J.
Archbell, of Bath, last night at
11 o'clock. Mr. Archbell was
one of Beaufort county's most
substantial farmers and oldest
citizens. By ancestry he was
connected with the pioneer he-
roes that settled old Bath and
laid the foundations for that lib-
erty we today enjoy. Although
about 85 years of age, he was
active and moved about with the
vigor of a man of fifty until a
short time ago, and suddenly
went to the good man's reward
from an acute attack of asthma
last evening. Mr. Archbell was
an uncle of Mr. M. T. Archbell
of this city, and the father of
five children, three of whom sur-
vive him. We extend sympathy
to all who share in this great
sorrow. The funeral will take
place Thursday at 11 a. m. from
St. Peter's church, and the inter-
ment will be in Oakdale cemetery.

The volunteer military com-
pany, under the command of
Capt. Ivey Foreman and Lieut.
W. C. Rodman and B. A. Jones,
left on the 2:30 train for Raleigh
yesterday afternoon. The com-
pany was made up of volunteers
from different sections and con-
tained sixty-seven men and three
officers. They were escorted to
the train by the Excelsior Brass
Band and about three hundred
people. The boys will go into
camp at Raleigh immediately
and from there are subject to
call anywhere. To us their de-
parture was a sad one and in the
crowd of enthusiasts we saw
quite a number in tears. The
boys were all in high glee and
we trust every one of them will
return home to the tune, "See
the Conquering Heroes Come,"
and their names written among
the bravest of the brave. We
believe they will never allow
their cause to trail in the dust.
