THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

Although the General Assembly has not been in session a week we are able to give our readers an outline of the bill that with some modifications and amendment that will probably be submitted to the people of the State for ratification at the polls, eliminating in a large degree the negro vote, and while this is trne, no white man will be deprived of the right of suffrage The bill is divided into ten sections, and was introduced into the House by Mr. Winston, of Bertie,

Sections 1 and 2 requires the voter to be 21 years of age, and fore the 31st day of December of a bona fide resident of the State for two years, of the county one year and of the precinct in which he proposes to vote six months But no person who has been convicted or confessed his guilt in ion. open court upon indictment of the following crimes: bribery, burglary in any degree, larceny receiving stolen goods, arson, perjury, rape, sale of cotton in form, or duplicate in event of prohibited hours, and etc or any crime whereof the punishment may be imprisonment in the pen iteutiary, shall be permitted to vote unless restored to citizenship as provided by law, and it shall not be necessary that any punishment has been imposed to bring persons within the prohibition of this section. Then again. Every person presenting himself for registration shall be able to read and write intelligently, and he shall demonstrate his ability to do so when he applies for registration by making under oath, administered to him by the officer hav ing in charge such registration. or by his duputy, both of whom are hereby authorized to administer such oath, written application therefor upon a blank to be furnished by such officer. The said application shall contain the necessary information to show that he is entitled to register and vote, and shall be entirely written, dated and signed by him, in the present of the registration officer or his deputy, without assistance or suggestion from any person or memorandum whatever, except the form of application herein set forth.
