Local and Otherwise.

Remember the young people's service at the City Hall Sunday evening. A special sermon will be delivered by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Nash. All cordially invited.

On yesterday the observer reported a northwest storm and later reported signals down. Dr. Gallagher prophesied bad weather, the result is the heaviest snow storm in years.

On Monday, February 13th the Washington Graded School, with the assistance of our local talent will present the well-known operetta, "Golden Hair and the Three Bears" Benefit of the Graded School library.

We clip the following from the News and Observer: "The handsome sofa pillow which was the work of Miss Lida Rouman, of Washington, and which she donated to the Confederate Bazaar was last night presented to Commander A. B. Stronach of L. O. B. Branch Camp. The presentation was made by Col. W. J. Standers.

This morning about 3 o'clock the cry of fire was heard. It proved to be S. J. Nobles' barber shop on Main street. The building caught from the fire place. One piece of the furniture was destroyed and other pieces considerably damaged. All the tools were injured. Mr. Nobles who rooms in the building endeavored to throw the burning furniture out of the window; in doing so his hand was badly cut and lacerated. The fire was soon extinguished.

A special from Tarboro of January 27th to the Greenville Reflector, says: "Twenty-one new cases of smallpox were reported in six miles of this town this morning. Today Tarboro quarantined against Norfolk. For the last few days people have been vaccinated by score and there is talk of making vaccination compulsory. Mr. William Howard, father of our lawyer, Mr. W. O. Howard, died night before last at his home a few miles from here, of smallpox."

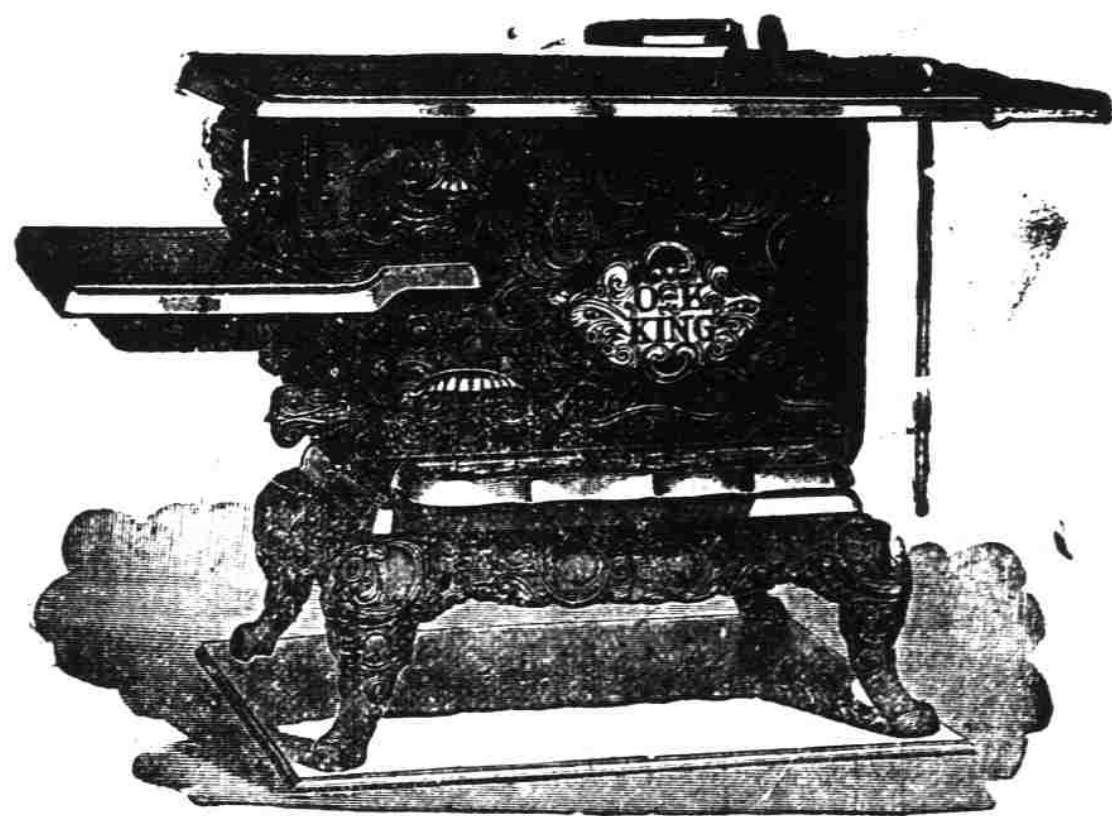
