Senator R. S. McCain, who represents Vance and Warren counties in the upper house of the General Assembly, has been appointed on what is generally considered one of the most important committees of the Senate. He has been named one of five whose duty it will be to investigate and report back to the Legislature on the advisability of the State establishing a purchasing agency for all institutions of every character owned and controlled by the State. The plan which is under consideration was brought up through a desire for injecting into the State's business management as much economy as was possible. A purchasing agency would, it is understood, have charge of all purchases of every kind for every State institution.
