MUSICALE.

The Red Cross Musicale of Friday night was a thorough success. The rain kept many from attending, but the Opera House held an attentive and appreciative crowd when the curtain rose at 8:30.

The stage was tastefully decorated in red, white and blue, and old Glory hanging majestically at the back of the stage formed a splendid background, and lent a patriotic atmosphere to the entertainment.

The selections by Miss Crichton Thorne were well rendered, breathing of reading ability and a graceful and charming bearing upon the stage. She was heartily encored.

The instrumental solo, by Mr. J. R. Rodwell, Jr. was of high order. Mr. Rodwell is a master at his art—and was at his best. Look out Paderwisnik!

Mrs. Norwood Boyd very charmingly filled a place upon the program and sang with her usual ability.

Mr. John Harris was there, bringing along his musical abilities. His solo, and his encoered selection, were much enjoyed. This time it is look out John McCormick!

The "Poor Butterfly" chorus was attractively led by Miss Lulie Price. The fifteen chorus girls were dressed in Japanese costumes, carrying fans, and thus the Japanese effect was well carried out. This was a much enjoyed number.

But need we say more, and yet we must mention the instrumental solo by Miss Isabel Broom; the reading by Miss Olivia Burwell; the instrumental solo by Miss Elizabeth Tarry; and the quartet by Messrs. Harris, Baxter, Rodwell, and Dameron, Miss Tarry at the piano.

The motion pictures were instructive, well-shown and much enjoyed. The entertainment was thoroughly enjoyed, and about fifty-six dollars was cleared for the Red Cross Chapter here.

WARREN COUNTY MEN SELECTED BY DRAFT ON FRIDAY

THIS LIST CONTAINS ALL NAMES OBTAINABLE AND ORDER OF SELECTION

For the benefit of those who now have their numbers and know about the order in which they are likely to be called for examination under the Selective Draft Law it may be stated that the next official move to be made, according to the regulations, is: The determination by the Governor of the quotas to be called and furnished by the several local boards. In Warren County this number is 152.

This will determine how many men from your district must go into the service. The possibility of exemptions will necessitate the examination of two or three times as many men as are needed.

The War Department's bulletin for the information of registrants reads in part:

As soon as quotas are assigned to each State and each board, each board will call upon persons whose cards are in its jurisdiction instructing them to present themselves for examination. This call will be posted at the office of the local board and the papers will also be mailed to you, but the posting of the list at the office of the board will be deemed sufficient notice to charge you with the duty of presenting yourself.

The law therefore makes it your duty to inform yourself when you are called. The mailing is for your convenience, but if the letter never reaches you, you cannot make that an excuse.

Watch the lists at the office of your board and see when you are called for examination.

You must report for physical examination on the day named in your call.

(a) If you are found physically disqualified the board will give you a certificate which will explain to you what your further duties are.

(b) If you are found physically qualified and file a claim for exemption within seven days after your call you will be given ten days after filing your claim of exemption to file proof in support of your claim of exemption.

(c) If you are found physically qualified and file no claim for exemption, or if you do not appear for physical examination, your name will be posted to the district board as one who was called for military service and was not exempted or discharged.

On the eighth day after call, or within two days thereafter, copies of the list of persons so posted to the district boards will be given to the press with a request for publication, will be posted in a place at the office of the local board accessible to the public view, and notice will be mailed to you at the address on your registration card.

Therefore watch the notices posted in the office of the board about ten days after the day you were called and make arrangements for the prompt receipt of mail.

The above instruction from the War Department therefore PUT IT UP TO YOU.

COMMENDS WATER SYSTEM

Mr. J. W. Kellogg, of State Laboratory of Hygiene, Raleigh, was in town last week.

Mr. Kellogg was here making the regular monthly analogy of our town water. While here, he commended highly our water system, stating that it was one of the best small-town systems in the state. He stated that aside from the pipey taste in the water that would be prominent on the dead-ends in hot weather, that he thought the system was excellent.

STREET WORK

The streets in South Warrenton are to be improved. This work will commence as soon as weather permits.

The street in front of Dr. W. W. Taylor's is to be widened, and concrete curbing cutter from the end of the bend toward Mayor Palmer's to the curve in front of Mrs. W. A. Burwell's is to be constructed. This will widen the corner, and materially improve the street. The street will be graded and soiled according to the lines of the new curbing gutter.

The same class of work will be built on Main street from Marshall street (the street in front of Mrs. Mattie Miles) to and including the curve at Mrs. Hal Macon's.

Work was let to Mr. E. L. Green on competitive bids for 69c. per linear foot, combined curbing and gutter.
