The following notice has been received by the Red Cross Chapter: Based upon recent cable advices

from our allies the following supplies are urgently needed and all chapters are asked to ship to the nearest Branch Warehouse of the Red Cross Supply Service whatever supplies thay may have on hand corresponding to this list and to speed up their work rooms on these particular articles. The production of bandages and surgical dressings should not be allowed to fall off. The needs are:

350,000 bath robes or convalescent gowns; 100,000 pairs of bed sacks; 700,000 handkerchiefs; 650,000 hospital bed shirts; 450,000 suits of pajamas; 300,000 shoulder wraps; 800,000 pair socks; 250,000 pairs ward slippers and many other needs.
